

Was He Born to be Hanged?

EXTRAORDINARY CAREER OF A MAN WHO COULDN'T BE KILLED. During his youth, writes a physician of a patient to the Mississippi Valley Medical Monthly, he was several times rescued from a watery grave.

In January, 1881, he was found in a fence corner completely moribund from the effects of whiskey and cold, from which exposure his feet were frost-bitten. I had great difficulty in reviving him from this state, and at different periods I amputated all the toes on one foot, leaving two on the other, all of which was done without the use of an anæsthetic.

Soon after this he received a second infliction of the baking process. Later still he was shot through the left index finger. He has, however, worked during the entire summer—making a crop—and that, too, without experiencing any inconvenience from the heat.

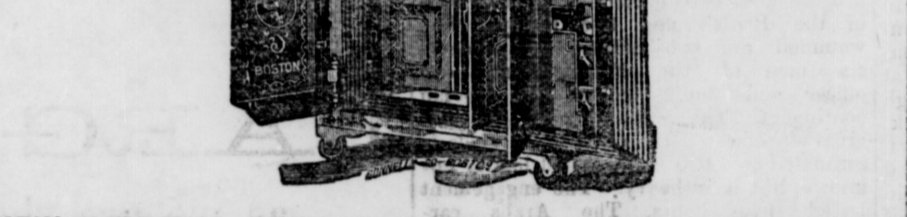
