

# Giants Defeat Dodgers 5-2 To Sweep Three Game Series

New York Giants swept their series with the second place Brooklyn Dodgers Thursday and extended their widening lead in the National League to four games.

The Giants produced a carbon copy of Wednesday's score, 5-2, and used a carbon copy of the hit that won them the first of the three-game set—a bases-loaded single by pinchhitter Dusty Rhodes just to the right of second base.

Rhodes' hit came in the eighth with the score tied 2-2. New York grabbed a two-run lead only to have Brooklyn catch up in the seventh on a back-to-back home runs by Roy Campanella and Carl Furillo. A single, a sacrifice, a throwing error by Campanella and an intentional walk set the stage for Rhodes.

Only two other games were scheduled in the major league Thursday.

New York Yankees moved within 3 1/2 games of the top in the American League by outlasting Boston Red Sox 8-7. Fine relief pitching by Johnny Sain through the last three innings stopped the Red Sox after they had trailed at one point by seven runs. Mickey Mantle, Andy Carey and Hank Bauer homered for New York.

**HOME RUN BARRAGE**  
They sprayed home runs in Milwaukee, too, as St. Louis Cardinals whipped the Braves 9-2. Joe Cunningham, who hit a home run in his major league debut Wednesday night, added two more Thursday and Stan Musial snapped a batting slump with his 25th and 26th homers.

Harvey Haddix, top winner in the league, was hit on the leg by

line drive by Joe Adcock in the fourth inning and was carried from the field on a stretcher. Hospital reports, however, said the Cardinal lefthander was not seriously injured.
