A pleasantly varied and interesting program was presented last night at Prince of Wales College Auditorium under the sponsorship of the St. Thomas Aquinas Society.

"O Canada" proved to be a delightful opening number as it was rendered in French by the Laval Choristers, of St. Dunstan's University. This group of students, directed by Father Adrien Arsenault, includes a number of students from colleges in Quebec affiliated with Laval University who are studying at St. Dunstan's.

Many, music has been a regular part of their studies and their presence last night added much to the excellence of the performance. The program continued with a group of songs by the Laval Choristers of which the first was a medieval student song. Sees Keswick, Canso Potatoes In Top Place

TORONTO, Jan. 15 — (CP) — Two new types of Canadian-produced potatoes—the Keswick and the Canso varieties—will probably replace Canadian potatoes now available. A. H. Martin, crops and seeds director for the Department of Agriculture, said today.

The varieties, product of an extensive breeding program centered at Fredericton, N.B., are beginning to dominate the market here, he told a reporter.

Mr. Martin said both Canso and Keswick are vigorous crops, attractive in size and appearance and have white tubers. They have been found to resist late blight.

Cooking tests, he said, have proved that both varieties are high in starch content, with more than an average yield.

The Department of Agriculture is taking a greater interest than ever in the production of a first-grade potato, he said. The main complaint of housewives has been that Canadian potatoes were badly graded in 10-pound lots and often bruised.

Potatoes should be handled in the same way as fruit, Mr. Martin added. "Although such specialized handling would obviously jack up the price, we firmly believe that the housewife would prefer to pay a little more if we could guarantee a first-rate article."

Verdict Of Acquittal In Supreme Court Yesterday

A verdict of not guilty was brought in by the Petit Jury last evening as the trial of Roy Walter Fall concluded in Supreme Court before Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy. The defendant was accused of possession of stolen goods and was defended by Mr. Allison Gillis.

Prior to the case going to the jury Mr. Gillis on motion requested the Court to order a directed verdict of not guilty. His Lordship refused, but complimented the defense attorney on the weight and force of his arguments and stated that they would be called to the attention of the jury in his own address. He refused the motion but said that it would be noted.

The accused was called to the witness stand by his attorney and denied all knowledge of the cigarettes he was accused of having in his possession. He stated he had never seen them. He was in the area where they were hidden at the request of his older brother who had told him at home that afternoon that he was going out to get some "shine" that he had hidden near the Mount Edward Road.

When the witness, his brother John Carl Fall, and Carl Prowse got out of the car on the roadway the brother had told him to watch out for the Mounties. While they were in the bushes his brother shouted "there they are" and he assumed the men were the Mounties. He turned to run, but tripped and was caught by the Chief of Police of this city.

Other Evidence John Carl Fall, also called to the stand, told of getting his cousin to

use his car, a coupe, while he went for the "shine" as he did not want his own car to be seized by the Police in case he were caught with the contraband in his possession. It was for this reason that he had told the driver to go up the road and turn but not to stop if there were more than three people on the road. He had gone to his home shortly after four o'clock that afternoon and got a flashlight as it would be dark where he was going. He asked his brother to go with him. The shine, he stated, had been obtained in the country and hidden in this location for a week.

He also denied having seen the cigarettes until they were produced in court and maintained that with five passengers in the coupe there would not have been room for the several cartons.

Under cross examination by Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, Q.C., Deputy Attorney General, he was asked about going together with two members of the Police Force to get other cigarettes. He denied having made any reference to cigarettes and stated the Police had told him to come with them. They had driven to a spot on Allen street near the County Jail where they found two bags containing a large number of Export cigarettes.

The charge against the accused arose out of theft of Exports from the premises of J. C. Montgomery Ltd., wholesale agents here for H.C. Fortier Co. of Montreal. The questioning along this line was objected to by Mr. Gillis, but the Court ruled

Education Week Committee Meeting

At their organizational meeting, held in the Teachers' Federation Office, Wednesday evening Mr. E. D. Reid of Charlottetown was again chosen chairman of the Provincial Education Week Committee.

Committees were chosen to deal with film, radio, press, clergy, contests, posters, and service clubs.

Education Week for 1953 will be celebrated throughout the nation from March 1st to the 7th inclusive. The slogan remains the same as in the past—"Education—Everybody's Business".

Schools Are What We Make Them. Assuming that the public generally has a poor understanding of the position and functions of the School Trustee, the Provincial Departments of Education, and of the real purpose and proper function of a well-organized Home and School or Parent Teacher Association, the National Committee wish these groups this year to be brought to the fore in the provincial and national celebrations.

Through the co-operation of the J. Arthur Rank Organization, an exceptionally fine film (full length feature) is being placed at the disposal of the National Committee for Sunday evening, March 1. Ten prints of "Mandy" will be made available for use in ten cities (one in each Province). With regard to this film, the Provincial Committee hope to be able to take advantage of the generous offer.

1953 will be the seventeenth annual observance of Canadian Education Week. Sponsors are: Canadian Association for Adult Education, Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Canadian Congress of Labour, Canadian Education Association, Canadian Federation of Agriculture, Canadian Farmers and School and Parent Teacher Association, Canadian Legion of the B.E.S.L., Canadian Manufacturers Association, Canadian School Trustees' Association, Canadian Teachers' Federation, National Council of Women, and Trades and Labour Congress of Canada.

Letters will be sent to all provincial school districts, requesting teachers, Women's Institutes, School trustees, Catholic Women's League, and the Fisheries' Federation to co-operate in district Education Week celebrations.
