Lumber Kings Win Allen Cup Playoff Series

PEMBROKE, Ont., March 27 (CP)—Pembroke Lumber Kings tonight won their eastern quarter-final series in the Allan Cup playoffs with a 3-2 victory over St. Francis Xavier University.

Kings won the best-of-five series 3-0 with one game tied. The series resulted when the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association ruled out Pembroke's wining goal in the second overtime period of a game in Antigonish, N.S.

Lumber Kings now advance to the eastern semi-finals against Jonquiere, Que.

St. Francis took an early lead in the first period but Pembroke tied it 1-1 before the stanza ended and went ahead 3-1 by the end of the second. St. Francis produced only one tally in a driving finish.

Basketball Rules Revised

SEATTLE, March 27 (AP)—The choice of whether to take the ball out of bounds or shoot for a free point after a foul was taken away from the players today by the national basketball committee of the United States and Canada.

The committee disclosed that the new rule, tried out Wednesday night by Illinois and Santa Clara, actually had been adopted before the game.

An announcement was withheld until today, however, as the committee wished to see the game and determine if any revisions were advisable.

While requiring him to shoot all fouls, the rule gives a player an extra shot if the first one is missed. This holds during the first 37 minutes of play in college, Y.M.C.A. and Amateur Athletic Union games. High school teams will play 29 minutes of their games under the bonus plan.

During the last three minutes of all games every foul called will provide for two free shots, and there will be no waiver.

Battle Of China Chins Tonight At New York Bout

NE WYORK, March 27 (AP)—Welterweight contender Johnny Bratton of Chicago and Rocky Castellani, ranking middleweight from Luzerne, Pa., clash tomorrow in the battle of the china chins at Madison Square Garden.

Bratton is a 7 to 5 favorite to beat Reeling Rocky in the 10-round catchweight bout which will be broadcast and telecast.

Bratton, with a jaw as delicate as a Ming vase has had it broken three times. Castellani has a push-button chin. One pop and Rocky goes down. But the ex-marine is game as they come and always bounces up.

Both lost in their last appearances in the Garden. The Bratton surrendered his National Boxing Association welterweight crown to Kid Gavilan in 15 rounds last May and in the process had his jaw broken and fractured his right hand.

Castellani was stopped in the seventh round by Ernie Durando Jan. 11 in the night of the big post-fight rumpus. Rocky's manager Tommy (Eboli) Ryan, baited referee Ray Miller and had his licence revoked.

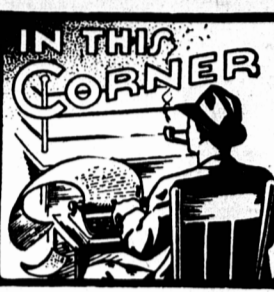

St. Mary's Down Islanders 3-1 To Take Long Lead In Series

HALIFAX, March 27 (CP)—Halifax St. Mary's, in control all the way, trounced Charlottetown Islanders 3-1 tonight to take a commanding 3-0 lead in their best-of-seven Maritime Major Hockey League semi-finals.

Saints won the game tonight in the first period, shooting two goals before Islanders replied with their lone tally.

Saints added another in the second and the third frame went scoreless as Halifax played a tight-checking game to guard their margin.

Bill Warwick scored twice for Saints, once in the first and again in the second. Bob Bonness scored the other.

Walt Pawlyshyn shot the lone Islanders' marker with an assist going to Red Favero.

The visitors seldom threatened. Following a plan of attack laid down by coach Wilf Field in the first game of the series, the Saints drew the opening faceoff and pressed the Islanders from the outset.

As in the two previous games, they gave goalie Ray Frederick a hot time throughout the contest, whipping rubber at him from all angles. Frederick turned in a performance that matched his play in the first two games in Charlottetown.

It was the Saints' trio of veterans, Joe MacArthur, Leswick and Warwick that set up the winning goal for the third time. But where Leswick applied the clincher in the first two games, tonight it was Warwick who did the honors.

Throughout the line-up, Saints played a standout game. Nipper O'Hearn had fewer shots to handle than Frederick but Islanders were dangerous on most of their drives.

Saints rearguard of Bob Drinville, Ralph Hosking, Danny Nixon, Fred Weaver and Carroll Bloom played a strong game and all three lines were going fast both ways. The top defensive players of the night were Leswick and Dewey Thompson.

Most of the string for the visitors was the Bonhomme, Marshall, Bellringer line. This trio of fast skating youngsters has been Islanders best in the series so far. Larry Travis and Phil Vitale played well on the backline.

Leo Lamoureux tried juggling his lines in the first period in an effort to find the combination that would throw the Saints off stride. It didn't work. The visitors kept the Saints off the score sheet until past the 15 minute mark of the first frame but Frederick was forced to come in with some outstanding saves to hold the onrushing Islanders off.

Pep's Comeback Hopes Blighted

NEW YORK, March 27 (AP)—Little Willie Pep's hopes for a comeback campaign were blighted today when the New York State Athletic Commission rejected the former featherweight champion's request for reinstatement.

Commission chairman Bob Christenberry and C. B. Powell, a member of the three-man board, met today to review Pep's case and decided "not to grant reinstatement at this time."

The plea for restoration of Willie's revoked licence had been made by the Hartford veteran. He wanted the 29-year old boxer's licence restored so that Pep could fight Jimmy McAllister of Baltimore in Holyoke, Mass., Monday night.

Pep hasn't fought since he had his licence revoked here for his four-packer match with featherweight king Sandy Saddler at the Polo Grounds last Sept. 26.

Graziano In TKO Victory

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 27 (CP)—Rocky Graziano tonight scored a technical knockout victory over Roy Wouters of Vancouver in the first round of a scheduled 10-round bout. The referee stopped the fight after 2:45 of the round.

Graziano weighed 164. Wouters 162.

Rocky, former middleweight champion who meets champion Ray Robinson for the 160-pound title in Chicago next month, was a heavy favorite going into the fight.

Simmons Ready To Return To Baseball

GOEPPINGEN, Germany, March 27 (AP)—Sgt. Curt Simmons—happy at the prospect of getting out of the army and eager to return to baseball—pronounced himself fit and ready today to help pitch Philadelphia Phillies to another National League pennant.

"I'm ready, I'll tell you," the big 22-year-old mound star said when told he would be sent back to the United States early in April for discharge from the army.

"I don't mean I'm ready to pitch in the National League right now. I've kept in shape and I've been throwing for a couple of weeks, but I've still got a lot of work to do to get in pitching condition."

"Physically, however, I'm in good shape and I think I can bounce back to form pretty quick."

Phillies' Manager Turns Tough

CLEARWATER, Fla., March 27 (AP)—Manager Eddie Sawyer of Philadelphia Phillies slapped a \$200 fine on third baseman Willie (Fuddinhamp) Jones today, demanding he expect the club's training camp austerity program to be followed to the letter.

Sawyer said in a statement Jones had been fined "for conduct detrimental to the welfare of the ball club." He declined to elaborate.

Sawyer implied that there may be more and larger cash punishments in future.

"The players have been warned collectively and in some cases individually," the manager said. "If one or two of them insist upon violating the rules then they'll pay for it."

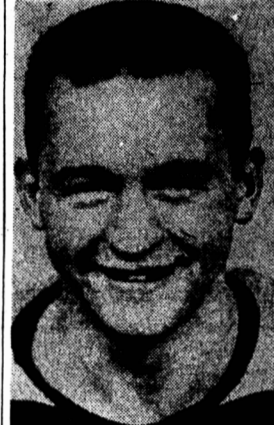
Ken Silvestri, newly elected player representative of the team, said, "If Jones's conduct was unbecoming to the club then it was unbecoming to each of us."

Canadiens And Detroit Score Shutout Victories

MONTREAL, March 27 (CP)—Rookie Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion fired three goals tonight and Montreal Canadiens, with sensational goal-tending from Gerry McNeil, snuffed out Boston Bruins 4-0 for Montreal's second straight victory in the Stanley Cup hockey semi-finals.

Canadiens now take a commanding two-game lead into Boston where the third game of the best-of-seven series will be played Sunday.

Ken Mosdell scored Canadiens' key goal early in the opening period. Before the period ended he was carried from the ice with a double fracture of the right leg.

Despite the shutout, the Bruins played a stronger attacking game tonight when in the opening Tuesday when they lost 5-1. Only McNeil's sensational work held them scoreless.

Canadiens, bouncing in front early as they did in the first game, hung grimly to their lead. At times they were bottled up by the pressing Bruins. In the last period, they struck only when chances offered and made the best of them.

They ran in two goals in the first period, goalie Jim Henry looking bad on the first, and the second came when the Bruins were shorthanded.

Big Ed Sandford, Dave Creighton and Real Chevrefils were the most dangerous forwards of the Bruins, while Hal Laycoe was the best on defence.

Mosdell's loss is a terrific blow to Canadiens. In the second-to-last game of the regular National Hockey League season, Johnny McCormack suffered a broken arm.

Milton Hornets Even Series With Cornwall
