# Can. Tourist Director May Open Big Lobster Carnival At S'side

John Fisher, executive director of the Canadian Tourist-Bureau, has signified his intention to be in Summerside to open this year's Lobster Carnival if he can possibly do so as it was revealed at last night's meeting of the Carnival committee presided over by chairman Roy Johnston.

Mr. Fisher informed A. H. Hubley, president of the Summerside Board of Trade who is chairman of the carnival committee, that he would let him know definitely by June 1 if he can be in Summerside on July 15th, to open the carnival.

He expressed his desire to be present in his letter to Mr. Hubley but stated earlier commitments might interfere.

Carnival director Charles Hogan informed the meeting that a display from the department of fisheries in St. Andrews, N.B., has been obtained for carnival week through efforts of Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P. He welcomed two

new members to the central committee, R.T. Henthorn who is the secretary and L.W. Hancock. Dave Carney who is in charge of this year's mammoth parade, stated 37 floats have now been promised with the objective set at 50. However the deadline for entries is May 20, he stressed.

He said that construction of floats in one of the sheds on railway wharf would begin shortly. Permission was obtained earlier to use the shed on the wharf, which will be the marshalling grounds for this year's parade on Thursday July 16th.

Mr. Carney stated that it is hoped to have eight bands in the parade and outlined the parade route which covers over two miles.

Herb Schurman stated that 15 fire departments from various

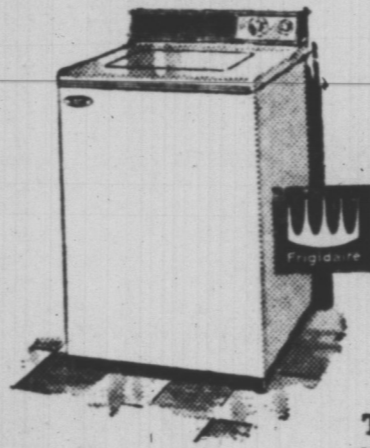
