She will leave this afternoon for St. John's, N.B. Her cargo will include 200 sheep, 20 head of cattle, 5 horses, 1500 bags oats, 2000 lbs. vegetables, 350 lbs. butter, and a quantity of boots and shoes, leather and other sundries.
