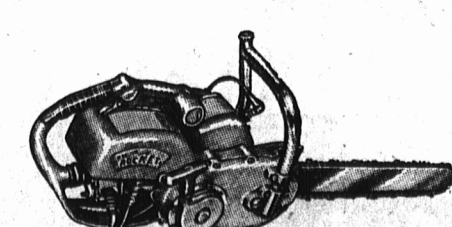

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GRAIN

WINNIPEG, Jan. 5 — (CP) — Prices dropped lower today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange under liberal liquidation generated by declines on U.S. markets.

The active session saw selling, hedging, thin support and local spreading—buying in the nearby contracts and selling in the deferred months.

New seasonal lows were scored by the May and July contracts of oats, flax and rye. Flax was sharply off.

Export loadings of Canadian wheat totalled almost 3,000,000 bushels, including: Germany 400,000; Italy 40,000; Belgium 100,000; Brazil 360,000; India 485,000; Japan 1,000,000; Switzerland 40,000; United Kingdom 400,000; and Bolivia 125,000. Trade reports also said 10 cargoes of Canadian wheat had been sold to Pakistan.

Prices for class two wheat northers were down 1 1/2 cents from Friday. Class two durums were up 1/2 cent. IWA northers and durums were all unchanged.
