Mice Hurl'd 'Into Space'

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—Four black mice rocketed into space Wednesday, but three hours later the air force said it is doubtful their satellite, Discoverer III, is in orbit.

Col. Richard E. Curtin of the ballistic missile division said no information had been received at tracking stations at Kodiak Island and the Hawaiian Islands.

Col. Curtin said information received at telemetry stations here, at nearby Point Mugu and an instrumentation ship 1,200 miles down the Pacific missile range indicated that the launching was successful. But he did not know why no radio reports were received from the satellite.

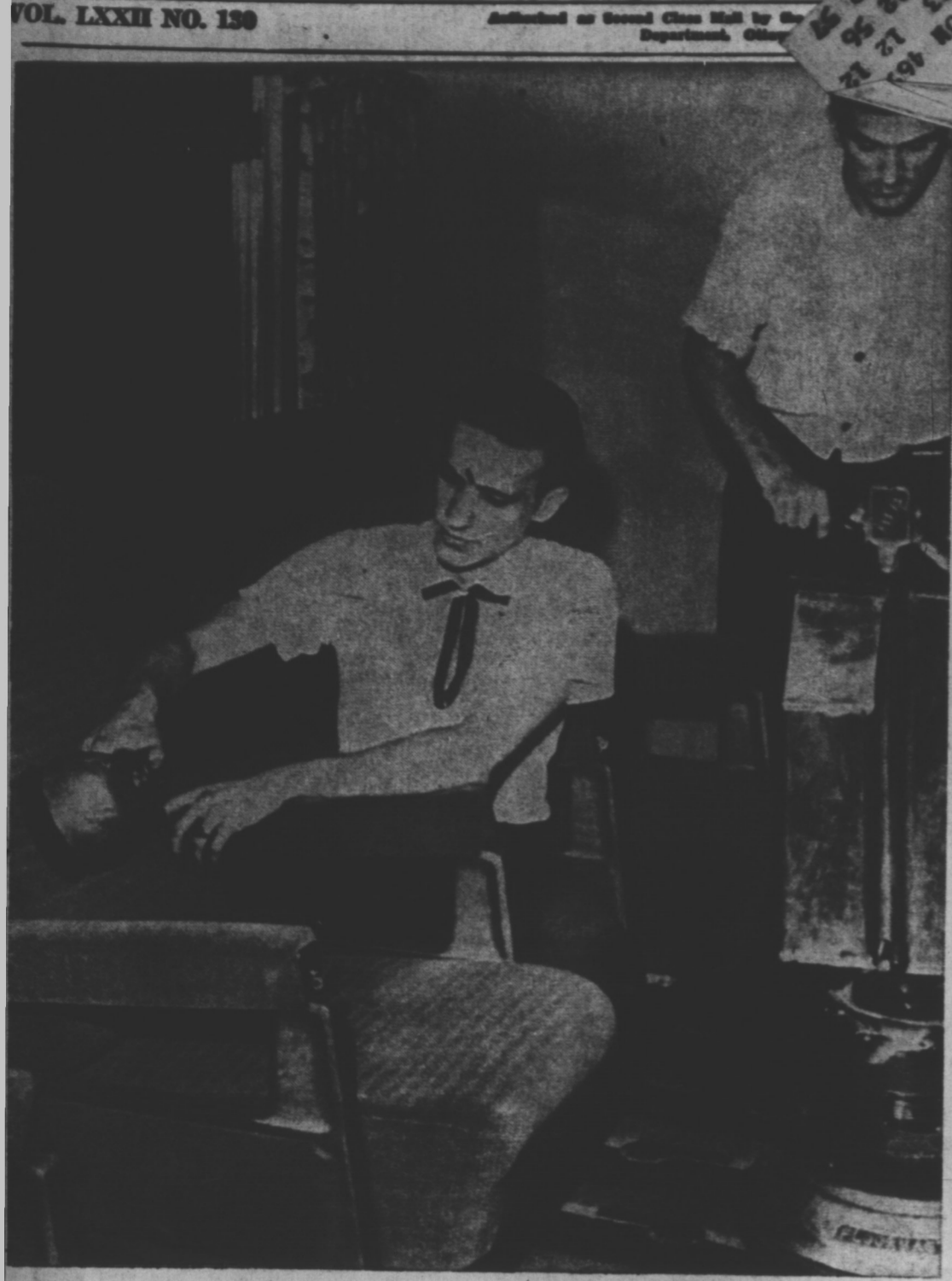

Canadians Win Millions On Irish Sweepstakes

Eight Persons Die In Rioting

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador (AP)—All-night riots here in Ecuador's largest city ended Wednesday with eight persons dead and the army in control. President Camillo Ponce placed the entire country under martial law and blamed the Communists.

Troops rumbled through this Pacific coast port city at dawn in tanks and armored cars. The display of force stopped more than six hours of fighting between civilians and police. More than 100 persons were injured and eight killed including a policeman.

Eisenhower Gives Terms For Summit Meet

By JOHN SCALI WASHINGTON (AP) - President Eisenhower Wednesday set the minimum price Premier Khrushchev must pay for a summit conference: Russian acceptance of Allied rights to stay in Berlin until Germany is united into a single nation.

For the first time, Eisenhower publicly disclosed that this is what he would regard as sufficient progress at the foreign ministers' level to justify a later summit meeting.

The American leader coupled this with a blunt statement that nothing has happened at the Big Four foreign ministers' meeting in Geneva so far to convince him he should go to a summit parley.

"I don't see how the head of my self-respecting government can go to an international conference in response to any kind of thing that can be interpreted as a threat," Eisenhower told a press conference.

Eisenhower's remarks were clearly aimed at serving notice on the Russians that they must not only abandon their campaign to force the West out of Berlin but also confirm Western rights to remain in the city.

Eisenhower put it in these words in saying there must be "a measure of progress" before he would go to a summit conference: "There certainly should be some agreement that until a reunification of Germany could, in the future, be brought about, there should be a clear commitment that our rights and privileges or (that) we will not be impeded in exercising our rights and privileges with respect to West Berlin—things of that kind. That . . . I would say, is specific."
