Very Latest Telegrams.

LONDON, Oct. 9. (even)—Mr. Gladstone has issued his address to the electors of South Lancashire, after reviewing the progress of reform in England, he proceeds to criticise the course of the government, and especially condemning the increased estimates in regard to Ireland.

The renewal must be applied to public and social works, and not to religious establishments. Mr. Gladstone closes with an appeal to the voters of South Lancashire, to support the only just policy which England can pursue.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—Advices from Rio Janeiro have been received. President Lopez has been defeated by the Allies, and obliged to retire from his position at San-Ferando. A report from Spain says that the Carlists are agitating the Basque Provinces and Aragon, and that some of the local Juntas have issued protests against the supremacy of Marshal Serrano.

GLASGOW, Oct. 8.—The Prince of Wales to-day laid the corner stone of the new University in this city. The Princess of Wales and a number of distinguished persons were present on the platform, and the ceremonies were witnessed by a large assemblage of citizens.

MADRID, Oct. 8.—The Provisional Junta has issued a decree reducing by one-third the tariff on all imports. Don Juan, as cousin of Queen Isabella, has resigned his pretension to the throne in favor of his son, Don Carlos.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Oct. 8.—The National Convention of French Canadian, in the United States to-day, adopted resolutions in condemnation of the British American Confederation and the movement on the part of the Canadian Government to coerce Nova Scotia into it.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 9.—In the International Cricket Match to-day, the first innings of the American twenty-two resulted in a score of 47, leaving the English eleven 70 runs ahead. In the second innings, the eleven left off with 17 runs and one wicket down.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—An Havana letter states that several cases of Cholera had occurred in the suburbs. The excitement for news from Spain was intense, nothing relative thereto being allowed to be transmitted over the Cuban cable.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Preliminaries of a naturalization treaty, similar to that recently concluded between North Germany and the United States, have been arranged between Lord Stanley and the American Minister.

There is another eruption at Mt. Vesuvius. The Emperor Napoleon offers his return from Biarritz. Chinese Embassy are making progress in their preliminary arrangements for negotiations with the British Government.

Leaders of Junta at Madrid are monarchial in their preferences, but have agreed to accept a republic if the people so pronounced at elections. There is another eruption at Mt. Vesuvius.

NEWS SUMMARY.

Our latest news from abroad, presents such an interesting and comprehensive aspect of the world, that we fear even a bird's-eye view can scarcely be offered in our columns. The events of this decade are marching on at the present time not very thrillingly, yet grandly.

Female Suffrage is gaining immensely. Mr. Barstow, one of the revising barristers for Cumberland, has admitted nine women as voters in the Parish of Castle Sowerby.

Considerable interest has been excited by the arrival in England of the new Embassy which the Emperor of China has sent to the U. States and Europe.

One feature of English life has been prominently exhibited in the late coming of age of the Marquis of Bute. The late Marquis being a man of enterprise and ability, and the accumulation of the estate very great, the young nobleman finds himself in possession of three hundred thousand pounds a year.

From Spain comes the news of a most serious insurrection. Difficult as it often is to understand the why and wherefore of foreign uprisings, it seems that this case is one of simple opposition to tyranny.

The Emperor of the French continues to mystify the unsophisticated as much as ever, by the inconsistency of his speeches and actions. The first deal with ideas and sentiments of peace, the second with Chassepot rifles, and gunnery experiments.

The Washington special to the New York Daily News says that Jeff. Davis will certainly be tried in October. They are trying to find the Wickedest Woman in New York, but the candidates are so numerous that the question can't be decided.
