Seal Hunting By Plane Said Over For Season

An intensive air search for seals carried out in a Piper Cub last week by Robert McIlwaine of Crapand and Glen Matthews, Alberton, failed to locate any concentrations suitable for commercial sealing by air plane. Their flight covered hundreds of miles of coastline from the Magdalen Islands to Cartwright, Labrador, northeast of Goose Bay.

At one time their plane was reported missing and the object of a search by the RCAF. How this came about they were unable to explain as their uncheduled flight was conducted as planned without mishap.

White in Red Bay, Labrador, they were instrumental in the rescue of four men who became stranded in an open boat about five miles offshore among drifting ice fields. After locating the men in a three-hour search they first dropped a large parcel of food and later directed the men to the boat.

They then dropped a note to the stranded party asking it to abandon the boat and walk to the edge of the ice. The ice was in a very dangerous condition and they could see from the plane that the leader in the trek across the ice was wearing snow shoes to locate a safe route and prevent him from breaking through.

During their three days in Labrador they flew supplies to a small community on Spotted Island where about 25 families live. On another flight they brought a small baby from hospital to her home in Red Bay.

Although they found living conditions very rugged in the various small communities visited plans were made to investigate sealing prospects again next year.

The study was started 14 months ago by a group who met to discuss what they felt was the need for a university in the province. Since that time about 20 persons have been involved in the study, which has been limited merely to a feasibility study of expansion to university status.

Pulp Mill For Newfoundland Is Being Arranged By Joey

ST. JOHN'S Nfld. (CP)—A pulp mill will be started in Newfoundland as soon as the government can complete the arrangement of timber rights with the two existing paper mills in the province Premier Smallwood said here.

Mr. Smallwood told the Newfoundland legislature that the Newfoundland Pulp and Chemical Company has a chemical sulphite mill ready to move in as soon as the government can concentrate timber rights on the east coast. The mill would be at Come-By-Chance in the north.

Mr. Smallwood answering a question by William J. Browne said Newfoundland Pulp and Chemical bought the mill from Brown Brothers as an American paper company operating six paper mills mostly in Maine.

The stainless steel mill built by Brown at Berlin N.H. four or five years ago to produce filter paper for cigarettes. The company's market for filters disappeared and because of a lack of paper for the area the mill was closed he said.

Pulp and Chemical has a market—Mr. Smallwood identified it only as a publishing company with several prominent magazines—for the chemical sulphite and wants to move in immediately.
