

Local and Other Items.

CHATHAM and Fredericton are to have first class Skating Rinks. PRINCE COUNTY Supreme Court is to have a breach of promise case. At present stoves look comfortable and feel doubly so when heated. EXECUTIONS are being issued against those who have not paid their city taxes. THE Steamer from Summerside carried \$12,939 worth of exports last week. THE canvas and duck seized by the Customs authorities in Montreal have been confiscated. AN article on the "potato crop of P. E. I." is or will appear in to-morrow's EXAMINER. DETECTIVE HUTT died in Halifax, N. S., a few days ago. He was well and favorably known here. AT the Truro races, on Wednesday, "Long John" won the 2.50 race, "Naud Mac" a good second in each heat. IN the County of Pictou there are 484 voters named McDonald, 434 named Fraser and 255 named McKenzie. MR. STUART ROGERS, the celebrated actor, will appear at the Academy of Music, on Wednesday evening, Oct. 18. THE freight traffic on the Grand Trunk is at present enormous; an average of 650 loaded cars pass a given point daily. ON exhibition at the Dominion Boot and Shoe store, cheap Boots and Shoes. Admission free to all; no tickets required. ENGLISH fair-traders are pointing to France's wonderful prosperity, which they largely attribute to a rigidly maintained tariff. TRURO'S Exhibition was opened on Wednesday. Oscar Wilde's influence was felt; the building was put up in the best style of decorative art. D. W. FREESE, of Portland, Maine, is in town. The gentleman is a teacher of the cultivation of the voice, and intends to settle in Charlottetown. THE roadway inside the railway yard leading down to the wharf is in a dangerous condition, being full of holes, sufficiently large to allow a horse's leg to go through. THE tender of Mr. Wylie, for the wrecked "Phoenix" at East Point, P. E. Island, has been accepted. The price is \$3,000. Mr. W. represents the Quebec Wrecking Company. MR. GREGORY, of the Fisheries Department at Quebec, has just completed a magnificent collection of preserved and stuffed fish for the International Exhibition to be held in London. THERE is a "hum" at present among the truckmen, and those who own a cart collect their charges rapidly. If you'd go down most of our wharves you would see the cause. This is a great joke. JUDGING by the number of "drunks" around the city, it is evident that the bung has been taken out of a number of "kegs." Whoever is Scott Act'ing this way should be promptly punished. A BOY named Joseph Barker, 16 years of age, was killed near Stellarton. He was driving a load of brick, and accidentally fell off, the wheel passing over him, causing almost instant death. THE civil service regulation making it compulsory that department employees at Ottawa shall not leave the building during the day is to be enforced, and those wanting to lunch will have to bring it with them. AN agent of the Canada Pacific Railway sold half a million dollars worth of property at Regina in Montreal. He arrived at Ottawa yesterday and gives glowing accounts of the new capital of the North West. BESIDES Lieut. Henry Hogan, of the Seaforth Highlanders, two other graduates of the Royal Military College, Kingston, have taken part in the Egyptian campaign, viz. Lieut. A. J. W. Sears, of St. John, N. B., and H. C. Freer, of Brookville, both belonging to the South Staffordshire Regiment. GOING ABOARD FOR NEWS.—The Summer-side Journal gives a budget of interesting "P. E. Island Railway Notes." The paper credits the "Notes" to the Moncton Transcript. Of course, the notes appeared a week ago in THE DAILY EXAMINER, and are the work of our own reporter. THE barque "Telegraph," Capt. Doings at Summerside.

SOME ONE HAS BLUNDERED.

SUMMERSIDE, Oct. 7.

Quite a large number of people—young and old—visited Summerside to-day for the purpose of attending the County Fair and Exhibition, which was advertised to open, but owing to the blundering of some person the exhibitors were not on hand, and the visitors saw nothing worth speaking of. To-morrow is now said to be the proper day. The people who came to town were not satisfied at seeing nothing, and some of them went home early in the day, very much disappointed; while others—many others—buried their sorrow in the flowing bowl. The principal streets were crowded with drunken men, many of them with girls on their arms and bottles of liquor in their pockets. The regular police made quite a number of arrests and accommodation at the police station being exhausted, several prisoners were put to jail. Some officious townsmen volunteered to act as special policemen. One of this kind endeavored to make an arrest on Central street, but the boys refused to recognize his authority, and he was last seen facing down the street, minus his coat and hat. Two others succeeded in capturing a drunken man and placing him in jail, and now the prisoner is going to take legal proceedings against them. The Scott Act is a farce here, pure and simple. There is said to be a medical gentleman here who is always ready and willing to issue certificates at all times and to all persons. On Sunday last he granted one for twenty-four bottles to one person, for medicinal purposes. But no certificate was required to-day. The illicit dealers refused, however, to sell by the glass, and thus forced their victims to buy a bottle, and the result was painfully seen and heard on the streets.

Sir Charles and Immigration.

The Herald's special from Ottawa says: Before returning to Canada Sir Charles Tupper visited Ireland, with a view to completing immigration arrangements for the coming season. He visited the counties of Galway and Mayo, and had interviews with both landlords and peasantry, and did everything possible to advance the interests and claims of Canada. He was accompanied by Mr. Turke, who administered the fund raised by the Duke of Bedford's committee for the promotion of emigration from Ireland. While at Dublin Sir Charles at the request of the Chief Secretary for Ireland, had a long interview with him on the subject of the administration of the fund voted by the Imperial Parliament for the promotion of emigration. He is accompanied to Canada by Mr. Foster, of Belfast, who has devoted most of his fortune to assisting servant girls to emigrate to Canada and the United States. Sir Charles found great interest exhibited in the subject of immigration by the Imperial Government, and the British public generally.
