—OLEARY TO HAVE CLINIC—Dr. J. P. O'Leary, Medical Director of the Maritime Depot, Canadian Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service, Halifax, and Miss I. Arsenault, Provincial Red Cross Commissioner, met with Mrs. L. G. Dewar, president of the O'Leary Women's Institute, and Miss Eva MacLennan of the United Young People's Union last week to finalize plans for the Blood Donor Clinic on Wednesday afternoon, August 2nd. This will be O'Leary's second Blood Donor Clinic and 100 donors are urgently needed if the Province is to reach its objective of 1000 which is the number required to repay the island's indebtedness to the Maritime Depot and to establish sufficient credit to carry the service along for another three months.

—PLAN BLOOD DONOR CLINIC—At a well attended meeting held in the Women's Institute Hall in Alberton last week, Dr. J. P. O'Leary, Medical Director of the Maritime Depot, Canadian Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service, Halifax, stressed the necessity of securing at least 100 donors at the Clinic to be held in Alberton on Wednesday evening, August 2nd. If the Province is to reach its objective of 1000, the meeting was called together by Mrs. A. C. Green, President of the Alberton Women's Institute. As it would be impossible for a community the size of Alberton to produce as many as 100 donors it is absolutely essential to have donors attend from all the districts surrounding this centre. It is encouraging to report that the Mill River East Women's Institute has already lined up at least seven donors to attend the Alberton Clinic. If each district could secure up to ten donors the success of the Clinic in Alberton would be assured.
