## THE TRANSVAAL AND BRITISH NOTE

### Conditions Which Boers Must Accept

ANSWER MUST NOT BE DELAYED.

An Acute Situation—Soon to be Settled

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Sept. 13.—A special despatch from Pretoria says that the final British note, which was read in both Houses yesterday, is regarded there as a virtual ultimatum.

The correspondent says it proposes a five year franchise, a quarter representation of the gold fields in the Volksraad, equality of British and Dutch in the Volksraad, and equality for old and new burghers in regard to presidential and other elections.

If these conditions are accepted a conference between the representatives of the two governments shall follow for the purpose of drafting the necessary measures, and avoiding of unnecessary conditions by the Transvaal Government, or the possibility of the passage of any new bills calculated to defeat the reforms.

In view of the fact, the note goes on to say, that the present state of affairs in South Africa cannot be prolonged, definite acceptance of this proposal is demanded without delay, otherwise Her Majesty's Government will immediately take the whole situation under reconsideration and will act so as to bring about a settlement.

The situation is acute.

### SAFETY OF THE SHIPS

Experiments With New Armour

LONDON, Sept. 11.—Interesting experiments with a new armour plate for warships has just been concluded at Shoeburyness, at the mouth of the Thames. The outer plate, six inches thick, is made of the best steel, the backing consisting of a special composition, the nature of which is being kept a secret.

New plates were fired at with a 350-pound projectile at a distance of 200 yards. When black powder was used the armour plate was, after several shots, found to be practically uninjured. The shot was in some instances reduced to powder by the force of the impact. With cordite it was found that the outer plate could be penetrated three inches, and under certain circumstances the shot went right through, but the severest tests failed to crack the plate.

In naval warfare, a hole made by a shot below the waterline can always be plugged up, but cracked and split armour plates necessitate dry-docking and new plates.

When two shots were fired simultaneously, hitting the plate two feet apart, there was still no sign of fracture.

### "Busby" Doomed.

LONDON, Sept., 11.—The imposing headgear of the Guards, the classic bearskin, is doomed. It appears that great difficulty has been experienced of late in keeping up the necessary supply of busbies in consequence of bearskins being scarce, and a committee will shortly meet to consider the important question of a new helmet.

### RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

Engine Driver Severely or Fatally Injured.

While crossing the iron bridge just near the town, he leaned out of the cab to watch a box which was heating, and in so doing came in contact with the bridge receiving severe injuries in the head.

### HUDSON'S BAY REGION

Illimitable Wealth—A Great Mining Centre.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 12.—J. A. Osborne, of the Rainy Lake Herald, and Dr. Pelton, of Waltham, Mass., arrived here from Hudson's bay to-day by way of Mississauga, on the C. P. R. They were away four months altogether, and speak in high terms of the wonderful resources of the Hudson's bay region. Both Dr. Pelton and Mr. Osborne are of the opinion that railroad connection with the Hudson's bay territory is desirable. They state, however, that the proposal to extend the line to Moose Factory is not a good one, as the harbor at this point is full of shoals. They believe the line should be built to Rupert's bay or some such port on the eastern side of the bay where the harbors are large and deep. While in the northern country these gentlemen met Mr. A. P. Low and Mr. Young, of the Geological Survey, who are making a survey of the coast line of Hudson's bay. When asked what he thought of the country Mr. Low stated:—"It is destined to become the great mining centre of the continent. Canadians have no idea of the wealth of it. Its fisheries and timber are also invaluable."

### Jubilee at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—Active preparations are being made for the celebration of the silver jubilee of the consecration as bishop of Archbishop Duhamel, which will be celebrated during the latter part of October.

### Trade Union for Peace.

PLYMOUTH, Eng., Sept. 10.—At the closing session yesterday of the Trades Union Congress, which has been in convention here, a resolution was passed urging the Government to use every possible effort to peacefully settle the Transvaal difficulty.

Demonstration in Hyde Park.

DIGBY, N. S., Sept. 11.—John Francis, a colored man supposed to be 97 years of age, was struck and instantly killed by a D. A. R. west-bound Bluenose train, two miles from Digby, yesterday, while walking on the track.

### Church of England

LONDON, September 10.—Most of the bishops, including the Bishop of Lincoln, Right Rev. Edward King, who was tried several years ago for ritualistic practices, have issued letters to their various dioceses ordering obedience of the archbishops decision.
