OTTAWA AND POTATOES

The information released on Tuesday by the Potato Board to the effect that the Price Support Board is prepared to recommend an initial payment of 15, 20, and 25 cents per bushel for potatoes under a marketing agreement will likely be received by growers with something less than enthusiasm. As has already been explained the Co-operative Marketing Act is not the usual vehicle for carrying a price support program.

The 1953 agreement did provide very important assistance in the way of heavy contribution from Ottawa. We do not think that the Ottawa officials were as much concerned with respect to that loss as they were at the decision of the Island growers in rejecting this system of marketing last fall.

Policy in potato marketing if it is to produce order and stability should have some element of consistency. It can't be one thing in the bad years and another in the good ones.

There is a great deal that could be said and written with respect to the position the industry is now in. It would be very easy to be critical, but for the moment we believe in giving the various groups now operating within the industry every opportunity of dealing constructively with the situation.

PRICE SUPPORT BOARD

When the Price Support Legislation was placed on the Federal Statutes a Board was set up to administer programs under the Act. This Board, in addition, administers the Agricultural Products Cooperative Marketing Act. While the latter Act comes under the Price Support Board it is not properly intended to provide Price support. The main purpose is to encourage marketing groups (preferably producer controlled) and to assist such groups in financing advisory systems for marketing products to market. This assistance takes the form of the Government guaranteeing an initial payment. This guarantee then serves as collateral for bank loans. Should the initial payment guarantee prove to be higher than the actual market price then the Government makes up the difference in what is known as deficiency payment.

The provision of price support in any form is in practice based upon Government decision. It is not one which the Support Board has unquestioned authority, nevertheless its advice on the matter will be of considerable importance.

ROYAL COMMISSION

The brief presented by the Federation to the Royal Commission on Canada's Economic Prospects has now appeared in the press, and readers are at liberty to form their own conclusions with respect to the material.

The Federation brief was courteously received and commented upon favorably by the chairman of the Commission.

The Federation Board of Directors quite rightly felt that the opportunity of making a statement was not one which should be neglected. The commission's report when completed will be an interesting and valuable historical document. It may not change the tide of economic affairs, but there is much to be said for making use of that vision with which all public people should be endowed.
