# Long Steel Strike Seen

HAMILTON (CP) — Observers predicted a month-long strike Wednesday as the Steel Company of Canada and the United Steelworkers of America (U.S.W.) remained deadlocked in their contract dispute.

Labor Minister Daley had no announcement about resumption of the government-sponsored talks broken off Tuesday as the strike began with the company offering a settlement amounting to five cents an hour more.

The union has asked for a package settlement of 33 cents an hour above the \$2.30 average paid under the two-year contract that ended March 31.

In New York State, a supplemental point system is used in case the rounds come out even. The Associated Press had Crawford ahead 6-4.

# Giants Down Orioles; Baltimore Edges Boston

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Breaking loose with a barrage of extra base hits, including homers by Jimmy Davenport, Valmy Thomas and Willie Mays, San Francisco Giants whipped St. Louis Cardinals 11-2 before 17,246 fans Wednesday.

The victory went to Ruben Gomez in the first into the right-field bleachers. Thomas sparked a four-run uprising in the fifth with his 370-foot drive over the left-field fence. Mays contributed another three-run blast in a five-run eighth inning.

Gomez retired the first 10 batters to face him and went on to finish with an eight-hitter and his seventh victory of the season, against 10 losses. Taking the defeat, Mays put his record at 9-9.

The Giants collected 13 hits off four St. Louis pitchers, including four doubles.

St. Louis didn't score until the seventh, when singles by Ken Boyer and Del Ennis, plus a walk and a sacrifice fly by Gene Green brought across the run. The second came in the ninth on a triple by Wally Moon and a single by Flood.

NEW YORK (AP) — Washington's last-place Senators, winless against Whitey Ford for almost four years, clobbered the stubby outpaw for five runs in the eighth inning and an 9-4 victory over New York Yankees Wednesday night. Roy Sievers hit a two-run homer for Washington, matching hitless Mickey Mantle for the American League lead with 33.

Ford, now 14-6 for the season, had won 12 in a row from Washington since Sept. 20, 1954, beating them three times this year.

The big eighth, lauding the Senators from behind after successive home runs by Norm Sieben and Hank Bauer had given the Yankees a 4-3 lead in the sixth, gave reliever Truman Cleveland a 7-3 record.

Clint Courtney and Eddie Yost also homered for Washington.

BALTIMORE (AP) — Baltimore Orioles edged Boston Red Sox 4-1 Wednesday night, with Gene Woodling knocking in both Orioles runs.

Frank Sullivan, Boston right-hander who entered the game with an imposing 16-4 career mark over the Orioles, took the loss.

The Orioles raked him for nine hits in six innings, with Woodling collecting two singles and a double.

Arnold Portocarrero, who had never beaten Boston before moving to Baltimore this season, chalked up his fifth straight over the Sox and upped his 1958 mark to 12-7.

CLEVELAND (AP) — Detroit beat Cleveland in both ends of a two-night doubleheader Wednesday night 6-2 and 3-2 to stretch his winning streak to five.

The Tigers' Herb Motford limped the Indians to three hits in the nightcap, a game in which Tiger outfielder Rocky Colavito placed three hitless innings. Brown straight hits and five runs to the fifth inning decided the opener for Detroit.

Colavito also had two of the hits off young Motford—a single and a run-producing triple.

CINCINNATI (AP) — Milwaukee Braves extended their National League lead to 5 1/2 games Wednesday night by beating Cincinnati Redlegs 9-2 and 4-2 in a two-night doubleheader. Juan Pizarro and Lew Burdette were the winning pitchers.

The Braves now have won 10 of 13 games against Cincinnati this year.

Pizarro allowed the Redlegs seven hits in the first game and Burdette gave up six in the nightcap.

Joe Nuxhall and Alex Kellner were the losing pitchers.

# Young Rifleman Outshoot Veterans At D. C. R. A. Meet

CONNAUGHT RANGES, Ont. (CP) — Young riflemen outshot veterans in early main matches of the week-long Dominion of Canada Rifle Association matches here.

The Gibson aggregate—for top scorer in main Monday and Tuesday matches of the meet—went to 20-year-old Christopher T. S. Beik, youngest member of the British rifle team.

A Saskatoon tyro, Denis Gough won Wednesday's Macdonald match with 123 points of a possible 125, outshooting about 630 of the country's best marksmen with the .303-calibre service rifle used in the annual matches at these ranges near Ottawa.

A tyro is a shot who has never placed among the top 20 aggregate scorers in the annual matches.

Weather so far has been excellent for the matches which opened with preliminary events Saturday when the final stage of the Governor-General's match is fired.

Officials also announced results of several team competitions.

The Royal Hamilton Light Infantry's "Gold" team shot 1,064 of a possible 1,100 to win the Kirkpatrick Cup for four-man team with highest aggregate in Connaught, Bankers and Macdougall matches.

Hamilton's Westdale secondary school cadets took the United Empire trophy for four-member cadet team with highest total points in tyro, Macdougall and Bankers matches. The young Hamilton shots had 974 points of a possible 1,000.

Westdale's "B" team was in second place with 936 and the Westdale "C" team third with 932. Runner-up was the New Brunswick cadet squad with 336.

# Ticats In 22-21 Victory Over Toronto Argonauts

TORONTO (CP)—Cam Fraser, Hamilton Tiger-Cats great kicking star, booted a single point in the final minute of play to give the Ticats a 22-21 victory over Toronto Argonauts in an exhibition football game here Wednesday.

The Tiger-Cats fought from behind to count 15 points in the final quarter to beat their arch-rival Big Four football union rivals on Fraser's single point with only 38 seconds left to play.

A summer crowd of 11,713 saw the Grey Cup champions overcome a 14-7 lead in the final 15 minutes by scoring two touchdowns, a safety touch and the game-winning single. It gave the Tiger-Cats their first exhibition triumph in four games. They lost twice previously to Edmonton Eskimos and British Columbia Lions.

ARGOS FALL APART  
Argos, beaten four times in league play last season by Hamilton, fell apart in the fourth quarter to hand the game to the snarling Tiger-Cats by sloppy playing. The loss gave the Toronto club a 1-2 record in pre-season games. They beat Winnipeg Blue Bombers and lost to Calgary Stampeders previously.

Fraser's game-winning point came after quarterback Mickey Trimark had tossed a 16-yard pass to Ron Howell for a touchdown that tied the score at 21-21 with less than three minutes to play. Humbert Bobo scored two other touchdowns for Hamilton and their other points came on a safety touch by defensive end Pete Neumann and a convert by Billy Graham.

Quarterback Dick Shatto and halfbacks C. R. Roberts and Joe Trivisonno counted the three touchdowns scored by Argos. Vic Kristopaitis converted two of them.
