COMMISSION TOURS DOCKS

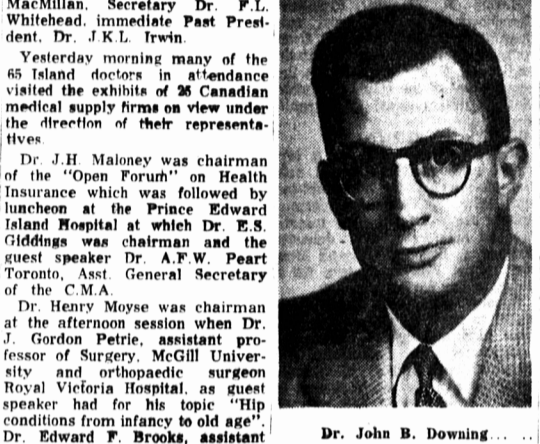
