Straight Party Lines Wanted in New Brunswick.

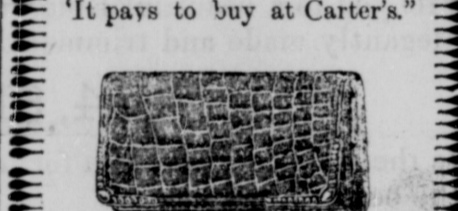
St. John, Nov. 10.—The annual meet-

House of Commons caused by the resig-
nation of Mr. Lount, has been fixed for
November 14.

George Bertram, of the Bertram Engine
Works, will be the Liberal candidate. The
Conservative most prominently named as a
candidate is A. E. Kemp, president of the
Canadian Manufacturers Association.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

NEW MARTINSVILLE, W. Va., Nov. 8.—
At Pine Fork yesterday William Conn, of
Cuba, N. Y., drove to a nitro-glycerine
magazine with a two horse wagon to get
twelve gallons of nitro glycerine to shoot
some oil wells over which he had super-
vision. While he was inside another two
horse wagon, with two men in it, who have
not been identified, drove up. Before the
strangers alighted, the magazine blew up
with a report heard ten miles away. The
only thing found was a piece of a man's
foot. Where the magazine stood is a deep
pit.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—A visitor who has paid
a visit to Harwarden, states that Mr. Glad-
stone is just as keen and active in his in-
tellectual appreciation of all that is pass-
ing in the world around him as he ever was.
But age is beginning to tell upon his robust
constitution. He is no longer able to take
his favorite walks. He cannot climb a hill
without difficulty, and physical powers a
not what they once were. The radiancy of
his mind is still undimmed, and his sym-
pathies with the great causes that make for
progress are just as warm as ever.

PARIS, Nov. 8.—A man named Dreyfus,
son of the Countess Decuestry, his wife,
Miss Rebecca Fortado, Abraham, an
American, and their three daughters, aged
respectively thirteen, eleven and seven,
committed suicide this morning or last
night, at their residence on the Avenue
Marceau. The porter of the house found
their bodies in their apartments early to-
day. They were lying on the floor in the
bedroom of the youngest child. Dreyfus
left a letter for the commissary of police
of that district, inclosing 400 francs, with
which to defray the expenses of the funeral
of the family.

TORONTO, Nov. 8.—The evening Tele-
gram's London cable reports British im-
ports from Canada nearly £75,000 in Oc-
tober as compared with £200,000 as compared
with October 1895.

NAPLES, Nov. 8.—Mount Vesuvius is in
great activity a mass of lava pouring out
of the Atrio del Cavello crater, which
opened in 1865. Two wide streams are
flowing down in the direction of Vitrova.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—A special despatch
from Paris says alarming information from
the Island of Madagascar has received the
French colonial office. Large bands of
well armed, disciplined rebels are scouring
Madagascar and cutting off isolated French
detachments.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—After a fight with
revolvers, in which forty shots were ex-
changed, six detectives from the central
station yesterday succeeded in capturing a
gang of six robbers at 63rd street and Madison
avenue. A search of the thieves
headquarters revealed \$10,000 worth of
jewelry, clothing and household furnish-
ings. The police say the gang was respon-
sible for most of the hold-ups and big
store and residence robberies within the
last year. The leader of the gang is
George Webster, who in September, 1896,
killed a saloon keeper at Frankfort, Ky.
He killed a man in the Standard theatre,
St. Louis, on April 7, 1896. He has served
thirteen years in various penitentiaries.
All the others have criminal records.
