The Island boats are being furnished. The English mail arrived this morning. The ham is beginning—at the wharves. STREET CLEANING is the order of the day. The "Carroll" leaves Boston on Saturday next for this port. SEVERAL thousand dock labourers have struck in Marseilles, France. BARON DE MAJON FREELAND and Mrs. Freeland have returned from England. Jet, Steel, Silver, and Gilt Dress Buttons in great abundance, cheap, at Young's. ROOM PAPER selling at cost at the Diamond Bookstore to make room for spring importations. SIR LEONARD TILLY was confined to his bed by illness on the 11th inst. He is now much better. The news from the Tishah district is optimistic, but the latest is that Gavin is leading by forty votes. FORT T. NEWBERRY, Esq., returned home last night from a business tour in the United States and Canada. L. B. ARCHIBALD, Esq., Superintendent of the P. E. Island Railway, and wife, arrived home last night. Tax gutters along Queen Street, especially those in the vicinity of Queen Square, are in a most filthy condition. The evening classes at the School of Cookery will open every evening at 7.30 instead of 7 o'clock. Doors open at 7.15. The "Hibernian" which arrived at Halifax on Friday evening, had the largest number of passengers that ever came across in her. MESSRS WILLIAM AND FRANCIS BATT left for Toronto, N. S., yesterday to bring over the new steam tug built for them at that place last fall. Work on the steamer which is to replace the "Heather Bell" is carried on energetically and the steamer will be ready for work early in May. The Scotch Dye Works, at Halifax, N. S., were rebuilt in seven days after the fire. The stock and energy of this firm is commendable. Mr. Theo. L. Chappelle represents the works in this city. The weather prophet Wiggins is coming on a lecture tour through the Maritime Provinces and the Eastern States. His chief theme is entitled, "How worlds are made, and what causes storms." The wheel of one of the cars on the "Northern Light" express broke at seven o'clock yesterday evening. One of the cars left the track, and the train, therefore, did not arrive in this city until two o'clock this morning. NEW SEASIDES at the Diamond Bookstore. The hands of Justice, by F. W. A COTTON MILL.—There is the very best of authority for the statement that Mr. Gibson intends this spring to commence the construction of a cotton factory at Marysville, York Co., N. B. A bridge will be built across Nashua river just below the saw and grist mills, and the flat on the opposite bank of the river is the site chosen. The mill will be driven by water power. We understand that the Tableau Vivants lately shown in St. Peter's schoolroom will be repeated on Tuesday next. An entertainment intended principally for children will also be given on Saturday afternoon. The Committee have tried to remedy the defects which were noticed on the last occasion, and which only a public performance, before a crowded audience, could have shown. The lighting arrangements have received most careful attention. The Rev. G. W. Hodgson leaves to-day for London (E. B.) in the hope that rest and a change of scene will renew his health, which has not been good for some time past. About a week ago Mr. Hodgson received a very kind address, signed not only by the members of St. Peter's Church, but also by others who occasionally attend the services there; and, through the courtesy, he received about \$150, as an earnest of the love and esteem of the congregation. His absence will be regretted, especially by those to whom he has ministered in holy things and who are engaged in the temperance work; and we are quite sure that all who know him will welcome his return. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] DOMINION PARLIAMENT. The Orange Bill. OTTAWA, April 17. In the House of Commons, yesterday, Mr. White, of Hastings, moved the second reading of the Orange Bill. Mr. Curran, of Montreal, opposed the Bill in a long, and somewhat violent speech. He claimed that the power of incorporating such societies was vested in the Local Legislatures; and that the Orange Association was declared illegal in the Province of Quebec. Mr. Curran, on concluding his speech, moved that the Bill receive the six month's hoist. Mr. Thomas White, Cardwell, defended the Orangemen from the charge of intolerance. He thought the Bill ought to pass. Mr. Couriel, Montreal, made a strong speech in opposition to the Bill. He urged the illegality of the Orange order, and pointed out many of its defects. Messrs. Wallace, Wood, McNeill, and others, spoke in defence of the order. On Mr. Curran's motion being put, was carried, 106 to 70. Only one Opposition member spoke on the Bill. The License Committee. The License Committee was organized yesterday. Several sub-committees were appointed. Curley's Trial. DUBLIN, April 17. The trial of Curley for the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke, was commenced yesterday. Fifty of the jurymen summoned were absent through fear—most of them having received letters containing threats of murder. Police Strike Attempted. DUBLIN, April 17. An attempt has been made to renew the strike of the Irish police. Telegraph Notes. The five-story building on Broadway, N. Y., occupied by Bradstreet's Commercial Agency and E. Remington & Sons, the rifle manufacturers, and the Hall Safe and Lock Co., was gutted by fire on the 15th instant, the total loss being about \$170,000. The fire is attributable to spontaneous combustion of the ammunition stored in the cellar, under the warehouses of the Remingtons. The trial of Daniel Catley, another of the men charged with the Phoenix Park murders, began on Monday. Of the 22 persons whom the prosecution will call, three are new witnesses who will testify they saw the accused in Phoenix Park on the day of the murder. After the verdict had been rendered against Joe Brady, on Friday, the foreman of the jury found a letter at his home making a frenzied appeal for return of verdict of not guilty, and warning him that otherwise he would surely be killed. Although true bills have been returned against eleven of the prisoners charged with the Phoenix Park murders it is believed only seven will be tried. It is stated that Delaney and McCaffrey will plead guilty. Peter Carey deposed, on Monday, 16th inst., that he was sworn in an inviolable by his brother. Kelly will be tried after Curley. A desperate affray occurred at Sandwich, near Windsor, Ont., on the 10th. Five desperate characters from Detroit, Mich., crossed over to the former town, and raised a rumpus. The police attempted their arrest but were driven back by the desperadoes who were armed with sharp knives. The citizens interfered to assist the police and a furious encounter ensued in which seven citizens and the police were wounded, two fatally. Three of the rowdies were captured in a bruised condition. The scene is said to have been the most terrible ever witnessed in that part of the country. Weather Bulletin.
