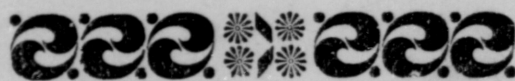

Bill Read in the House First Time.

DEATH OF SPEAKER EDGAR
HIS PROBABLE SUCCESSOR.

Sir Louis Davies Unwell—Speaker
of the Senate Will go to Paris.

OTTAWA, August 1.—Mr. Laurier announced in the House last night the death of Sir James Edgar.

This is the first time in the history of Canada that the Speaker has died during a session.

When the House met, the Premier in the absence of Mr. Blair introduced a bill to authorize the Government to construct branch line from Charlottetown to Murray Harbor in P E Island as a public work.

The bill was read a first time. The report is current that Speaker Pelletier of the Senate is to be appointed a commissioner to Paris and that Senator Power may be offered the Speakership.

Sir Louis Davies is suffering from chill and was not able to be in the House yesterday.

There is a good deal of speculation as to who will be Speaker of the Commons, the general idea being that Deputy Speaker Brodeur will be promoted. It is said that the Deputy will be either Ellis of St John or Bain of Wentworth.

THE JACQUES CARTIER BANK

Suspends Temporarily on Account of
Run Upon it.

MONTREAL, August 1.—Many rumors were on the street yesterday regarding the Jacques Cartier and as a result the price of stock has dropped.

Owing to the continual run upon the bank which commenced on Saturday the directors decided to suspend temporarily. In an official notice issued by the directors they say the run is entirely unjustifiable, as it continues in spite of the bank's desire to meet all demands; and as it is impossible to realize at once on all values it is considered best to temporarily suspend in order that assets may be realized.

SCHOONER WRECKED AT ST. PETER'S

"Our Hope" Owned by Wm. D. Coffin.

LOADED WITH SHINGLES FOR
HER OWNER

Struck on the Bar—No Insurance on
Vessel or Cargo.

ST. PETERS BAY, August 1.—The schooner "Our Hope" owned by Mr. Wm. D. Coffin of this place was wrecked on St. Peter's Bar last night. She was from Amherst, N.S., and had a load of shingles for her owner.

After the schooner grounded, her cargo was thrown over board in the hope of floating the vessel but the attempt proved to be a failure.

No lives were lost. There is no insurance on either the schooner or the cargo.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE, MEETINGS GROWING IN IN- TEREST.

Largest Enrolment Ever Made.

THURSDAY, July 27: The school in creases in numbers and interest. Each day adds considerably to the enrolment which has now reached 197. The largest enrolment previously made was in the year 1897 at Yarmouth, which was 192.

The excursion planned for today was postponed on account of the weather. In the evening Dr. Baily of U. N. B., Fredericton, N. B., gave an illustrated lecture on the relation of Geology to History, which was largely attended and very interesting and profitable.

FRIDAY, July 28: The morning dawned bright and beautiful and gave the hope that the "climb" up the Sugar Loaf which had been postponed for two days on account of the weather would be undertaken today. In this hope we were not disappointed. After the morning lectures and a hearty dinner, a party of nearly 200, bent on investigating the geology and flora of the mountain, started out enthusiastically for the climb. The enthusiasm of many waned before the summit was reached, but almost all persisted and were rewarded by one of the most magnificent views to be had in any part of these provinces. Returning from this tramp, tired and hungry, it was anticipated that the number at the evening's round table talk would not be large. In this, however, we were mistaken. With the true scientific instinct, on quest of knowledge bent, a large number assembled to hear Messrs. Vroom, Robinson and Hay's discourses on botany. The burden of their discussion was for a rational way of teaching botany, not from the text-book, but from the plant as it grew on the soil. Not to calculate the number of its petals and sepals, but to study its habit of life, its uses, how and best to perpetuate the more profitable ones, and particularly to inculcate a love for plants and plant life and that a generation might grow up who would insist in the preservation of our forest trees.

SATURDAY, July 29: Another fine day saw the scientists enthusiastically at work. The afternoon field work was performed in vicinity of Dogberry's Brook, where an excellent opportunity was afforded for Botanical, Geological and Zoological work. In the evening there was given the first of the Summer School of Science concerts for this year. Some of the best elocutionary and musical talent in the Maritime Provinces took part in the concert and like the rest of the Summer School, was a most pronounced success. The spacious hall of the high school building was crowded to the utmost capacity by an interested and appreciative audience.

THE QUEEN'S COUNTY JUDGE.

The Question Brought Up in Parliament

SIR WILFRID LAURIER KNEW
NOTHING ABOUT IT

Messrs. Martin and McDonald Bring
it to their Notice.

OTTAWA, August 1.—On a motion to go into supply Mr. Martin asked why no appointment had been made of a successor to the late County Court Judge of Queen's, P. E. Island.

He stated that the position had been months vacant, and that there was no machinery for the performance of the duties by a substitute judge.

The court was now about to meet and those interested would have to go back home without a hearing.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the reason the appointment had not been made was that the Opposition had been giving the Government so much trouble that there had been no time to attend to it.

Mr. McDonald said this was frivolous. The case was too serious to be put off that way. There was no reason for this delay except that the Government's own friends in the Province had been giving the Government trouble over their rival claims for the appointment.

Hon. Mr. Foster asked Mr. Laurier if he had nothing better to say than what he had said.

Mr. Laurier said that he had no knowledge of the matter, but would consult Sir Louis Davies.

STEAMER AILSA CRAIG SEIZED

For Carrying a Large Quantity of
Contraband Cigars.

NORTH SYDNEY, C. B., August 1.—Customs officials made a big seizure at this port yesterday. The steamer Ailsa Craig from Rangoon, India, with a cargo of rice for Montreal arrived for bunker coal, and was seized by Customs officials for having on board a large quantity of cigars. This steamer when at this port two years ago, was reported to have disposed of contraband cigars in large quantities.

—The Winnipeg Tribune, a Liberal paper which has some regard for Liberal principles, was speculating a few days ago upon the unexpected subsidies (which however, it estimated would be only about \$3,000,000) and in that connection cited the following as part of an official declaration made on behalf of the Liberal party prior to the general election of 1896:—

"The policy of bonusing railways by cash and land grants from the Dominion Government has become a fruitful source of jobbery, speculation, and corruption

The policy of granting the subsidies has repeatedly been condemned in Parliament by the Liberal party."

But notwithstanding all this, the Liberals have bonused railways year after year and this year they propose to make railway grants amounting to the enormous sum of \$6,500,000,—sending the Parliamentary grant of the year up to the unprecedented amount of more than \$60,000,000.
