North dealer. North-South vulnerable. ♠ J 7 4, ♥ A 6 5 4, ♦ A 8, ♣ A J 4 3.

♠ Q 6, ♥ 8 4 3, ♦ K Q 6, ♣ 4 3 2. ♠ A K 10 9 5, ♥ J 7, ♦ J, ♣ K Q 10 9 8.

The bidding: North 1♣, East 2♠, South 3♠, North 3♠, East 4NT, South 5♠, North 5♠, East 7♠ (!) Pass.

South might well have contented himself with a small slam, but since he did go limit, it was strange that he preferred spades to clubs.

Orders Already Going Out For 1957 Car Parts

CLEVELAND (AP) — Although some U. S. automobile parts manufacturers are going out of business, the survivors already are ordering steel for 1957 car parts.

The partsmakers are requesting June delivery, with most orders for strip and sheet and some for bars, the metalworking weekly says.

Ordering of steel for 1957 models was stimulated when one of the big three auto producers advised its partsmakers to cover on steel against contracts for accessories which are being placed in growing volume.

But despite this bright outlook, some parts makers are dropping out of business and more are expected to do so.

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Tornado Kills 15 And Injuries 100 in Alabama

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — A tornado killed at least 15 persons and injured an estimated 100 Sunday when it smashed through a rural area near Birmingham.

Many of the injured were brought to Lloyd Noland Hospital, which called in all available staff physicians and nurses to handle the overflow of patients.

The tornado was one of two which struck Alabama. Another small twister lashed Huntsville north Alabama, causing heavy damage but no injuries.

Most of the dead and injured were from McDonald's Chapel, about 12 miles northwest of Birmingham.

Several Birmingham area sections were lashed by violent blasts of winds which blew down or damaged heavily a number of homes and buildings in East Birmingham and near suburban Tarrant City.

The Huntsville storm partly unroofed the First National Bank building, battered other buildings, and blocked many streets with fallen trees and live wires.
