The president, Mrs. David L. McIntyre, presided and opened the meeting with the collect for the 5th Sunday in Lent.

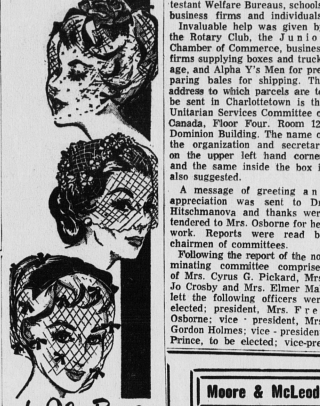
Plans were made for the Easter tea to be held on the first and second of Easter Sunday.
