Camping Areas Reported Full

Though the camping facilities in all areas of the National Park, with the one exception at Rustico Island, are full, park officials seem to think that the influx of tourists is down somewhat during the past few days.

Camping facilities at Cavendish and Stanhope were reported filled yesterday with a number of vacancies being reported at the Rustico Island campground.

Accommodations for trailers at Cavendish and Stanhope include 77 and 14 respectively with 226 camping facilities at Cavendish and 166 at Stanhope.

Don McAuley, North Shore park superintendent, said yesterday that he noted the highest concentration of tourists between the last week in July and the first week in August.

"Beach usage on the North Shore has remained high for the past number of weeks due to ideal weather for sun bathing and excellent water temperatures for swimming."

To insure protection of camping facilities as well as the possessions of each individual camper, three park wardens and one commissioner per campground are constantly on the ground for vandalism.

Mr. McAuley reported that there are the usual number of damages occurring around the park area. This involves the government owned facilities such as windows and plumbing facilities. "There have been a few cases of petty theft," said the superintendent.

PWC Alumni Reorganization Left With Means Committee

A ways and means committee consisting of Harry Kiely, Keith Pickard, Wilson Ross, Eugene MacDonald, and Dr. Athol Roberts was selected by unanimous consent at a meeting to re-organize the Alumni Society held at Montgomery Hall last evening.

This committee will look into steps leading to development of the Alumni and will draw up a constitution with the legal advice of J.P. Nicholson.

The meeting was opened by Ian Robertson welcoming the Alumni members on behalf of the committee who first looked into re-organization.

Hon. F. Walter Hyndman then took the chair as past president of the former Alumni Society which was discontinued several years ago. He appointed, with the approval of the assembly, a nominating committee consisting of Ian Robertson, J.P. Nicholson, and Eugene MacDonald who were to choose the above committee of five.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon addressed the meeting on behalf of the administration and spoke on the history of Prince of Wales College, its future, and the importance of the Alumni to the college in its capacity of appointing seven of the fifteen members of the board of governors after an interval of seven years.

He expressed the belief that the purpose of the college is to develop into a first class university in the faculties of arts, science and education.

Dr. G. Dewar briefly addressed the meeting and a general discussion took place on ideas for future development of the university.

A meeting will be held in two weeks to consider acceptance of the constitution and the committee's recommendations as to ways and means of securing a charter.

The temporary executive until the next meeting in two weeks consists of Hon. F.W. Hyndman, chairman, and Sue Martin, acting secretary.

Magistrate Says King St. Is In Need Of Cleaning Up

Two youths were each given 20-day suspended sentences on conviction of "loitering" yesterday in city police court.

Edmund Somers, Bradalbane, and George McLaine, Hamilton, Ont., currently visiting his former home in Milton, were given the penalty as a result of charges arising from an incident about 2:30 Wednesday morning on King Street.

Testifying yesterday were Cst. Donald Trainor, a Mrs. Prunty, and the two accused, who had each pleaded guilty to the charge.

Referring to the area where the event took place, Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, commented that "we've got to clean it up."

"Anyone who's down there and causing trouble is going to be punished," he said.

There were only three other cases on the docket.

The case of Brian David Foley, Charlottetown, charged with failing to stop at red traffic light, was adjourned to Aug. 13 following testimony by Cst. Allan McLeod and by the accused, who pleaded not guilty.

HALIFAX (CP) - The weather office says light showers were reported in New Brunswick and western parts of the other two provinces Thursday evening and fog lay thick along the South Shore of Nova Scotia, and along the Bay of Fundy coast of New Brunswick.

Cooler air was once again advancing south from Quebec, creating cloudy weather with showers and a few thunderstorms at its leading edge. The leading edge of the cooler air should move across the district today, producing generally cloudy conditions with showers in all regions. By this evening the cooler air should have pushed far enough south to allow skies to clear over the northern sections of New Brunswick.

On Saturday most of the district is expected to be cloudy with little temperature change foreseen.

Regional forecasts: Northern Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick Counties: Cloudy with scattered showers. A few thunderstorms this afternoon. Seasonable temperatures. Winds southwest 20, becoming light this evening. Low-high at Kentville 58 and 75, Charlottetown and Moncton 55 and 73. Outlook for Saturday: Cloudy. Clearing near noon. Little change in temperature. High tide today at Charlottetown 12:57 a.m. and 12:10 p.m. At Rustico at 7:16 a.m. and 9:51 p.m. Summerside tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 6:22 a.m. and sets at 8:13 p.m. All times ADT.
