LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

A CORRECTION. Sir,—In your editorial of yesterday appears the following statement: "We note that since 1891 the amount bearing interest at Ottawa on Land Purchase Accounts has been reduced from \$139,101.57 to \$39,178.44." The Government are using the sums obtained for the sale of the lands purchased with the \$110,000 thus obtained as ordinary—that is to say they are withdrawing capital from Ottawa, and are indirectly using it for revenue purposes. As a matter of fact the Public Accounts show the balance on Land Purchase Accounts available for the purchase of estates on 31st December, 1890—\$50,390.57, and the balance on 31st December, 1894, \$39,178.44, showing the amount withdrawn since the present Government came into power to be \$11,212.13. A portion of the \$11,212.13 was for the purchase of estates agreed upon by the former Government. Only a small portion of that amount has been paid back into the Land Office, so that besides being nearly \$100,000 astray in your figures, the point intended to be made does not apply.
