Notes and Comments.

—The Empire remarks that two hundred millions more capital is invested in Canadian manufactures than ten years ago—and yet the Grits are not satisfied.

—The latest Musical Times, London, says: "Oratorio enters far more completely and extensively into the musical life of the English people than any other form of the art. Together with the cantata, sacred or secular, it constitutes the staple of every festival programme. At all (festivals) oratorios constitute the musical raison d'être."

—A San Francisco dispatch reports that on May 28 the Hawaiian Legislature will meet, and the most important subject to come before that body will be the question of annexation to the United States. From what can be gathered the proposition seems to meet with favor, and it is not considered a hard matter to determine the outcome if the legislature submits the question to the people. Sugar planters are working for annexation, and are using all means to carry it to a successful issue, even if the final vote of the inhabitants of the island be necessary to insure its success.

—The Globe being so fond of publishing facsimiles of letters, the Empire suggests that it devote a page to the note in which Mr. Laurier gave Parnell permission to go to Europe; the note in which Mr. Chablon refers to J. D. Edgar as a "machine politician"; the letter in which Sir Richard Cartwright calls the Maritime Provinces "shreds and patches"; the letter in which Edward Farver advises the Grit party not to make "two bits of a cherry," but to go in for immediate annexation; or some of the numerous letters written by Count Mercier, and which it was asserted during his first trial had been somehow or other lost.

The circumstance of this trying bereavement are sad in the extreme. She was laid to rest at the old cemetery, Crapaud, today, the 16th inst.

School Examination.

The Superintendent of Education made a personal examination of the school at Cardigan Bridge on Thursday, the 5th inst. He expressed great satisfaction at the good condition of the school building, furniture and grounds, and was highly pleased with the proficiency displayed by the scholars, both in the primary and advanced departments. The teachers, Mr. Timothy McDonald and Miss Kennedy, are to be congratulated on the great progress the scholars under their charge have made during the past year; and they were highly complimented by the Superintendent. A number of visitors from the village were present during the examination, among them the Chairman of the Trustees, Wm. P. Lewis, Esq., who is always attentive to the interests of the school.

There seems to be no good reason why the school at Cardigan Bridge should not be ranked as a grammar school in the future, as we are informed that the Superintendent found in it the necessary qualifications. It is to be hoped that he will urge the matter on the Board of Education.

Good Breeding in King's County.

Among the promising young horses in King's County that are likely to give a good account of themselves during the present season mention may be made of the handsome All Right filly owned by D. Reilly, Esq., Montague, that took first prize at the King's County Exhibition last October for carriage filly under three years. During the past year this filly has been well handled, and is now showing fine development of speed, trotting halves in 1:20 on ordinary tracks. Along with being an excellent representative of the celebrated All Right family, this filly combines the blood of such noted sires as The Flying Frenchman, Melnis pony and Slidin, and we will be much disappointed if the present season does not see some record breaking in the 3 year-olds.

Mr. Reilly is also fortunate enough to have a fine horse foal from Elmo, 227, out of the dam of his All Right filly, and all who see it are loud in their praises of its beauty.

New Perth Notes.

Notwithstanding the cold, unfavorable state of the weather, the farmers of this section, having faith in the promise of the Divine lawgiver "that a harvest as well as a seed-time will be given," have been diligent in business; and already the greater part of the seeding is completed.

The work of building the cheese factory is being rapidly pushed forward by the energetic contractor, Mr. James Murphy. The contract for furnishing milk cans has been awarded Mr. J. D. Bell, of Montague. Mr. Bell is an enterprising tradesman, and it is to be congratulated on securing so important a work.

Mr. T. J. Dillon, of Ingersoll, Ontario, manager of the Experimental Station, arrived here on Friday last. While the factory is in course of construction he will make all necessary arrangements for bringing this important undertaking to a successful issue.

Few persons in the past the people of New Perth have been at a disadvantage for want of a suitable place for holding public meetings. Some of the young men who are identified with the temperance society of this place have organized themselves into a committee, for the purpose of building a public hall. They have succeeded in enlisting the sympathy and aid of the good ladies, and intend holding a grand Tea Party early in July, for the purpose of raising funds to carry out the project. The committee will spare no pains to make the occasion pleasant and enjoyable.

New Perth has long been known as a fine agricultural settlement, and will this year afford an additional attraction in the Experimental Station, the first of the kind established on Prince Edward Island.

The section of country now known as New Perth was at one time covered with a forest, the thickest and heaviest that then covered the face of our Island home. In this howling wilderness, nearly seventy years ago, a small body of men and their faithful wives from the highlands of Perthshire sought a home. With fortitude and patience they endured all the hardships and privations incident to pioneer life, and in the course of time had their reward, for their long years of toil and self-sacrifice, in seeing the "forest primeval" give way to a beautiful landscape, adorned with fertile fields and comfortable smiling homesteads.

Sir Walter Scott tells us that the County of Perth is the most beautiful County in all Scotland; and although our Island Perthshire cannot boast of such scenery as "the steep frowning glories and the crags that are wild and majestic"—such scenes described by Sir Walter as "beauty lying in the lap of terror"—yet we should feel grateful that Mother Nature, in distributing her bounties, has not been unkind to us. In the Glen of the Gulf it is to be found a wealth of pastoral beauty of which we should all feel proud. And our quiet settlement, which bears the name of the great old County from which its people came, is for beauty of landscape and fertility of soil unsurpassed in Prince Edward Island.

TEMPER.

Cattle Shipments at Cardigan.

The schr. Soudan, DeCosta Master, sailed from Cardigan Bridge for St. John's, N.B.I., on Saturday, the 14th inst., with 61 head fat cattle and 21 sheep, valued at \$2,300.00, shipped by Jas. E. Macdonald, Esq. This cargo, one of the largest of fat cattle shipped from King's County for some years, included many excellent animals, among which was the fine Shorthorn bull fed by Mr. James MacLeod, of Victoria Cross, weighing 2,000 lbs.; a well-fatted cow fed by Mr. Wm. Nicholson, of Dundas, weighing 1,315 lbs.; and four two-year olds fed by Mr. George E. Goff, of Cardigan. All the cattle in this cargo were fed in the adjoining settlements, and were sold at fairly good prices.

On the 17th inst. the schr. Orlon sailed from Cardigan Bridge for St. Pierre, Miquelon, with the following cargo, viz., 32 head fat cattle, 35 fat sheep, and a quantity of potatoes, valued at \$1,300.00, shipped by D. C. Morson & Co.

The shipment of the above cargoes has made trade brisk around Cardigan during the past week.
