From a survey of the 190 cases, in 161 of which check-ups were made from a review of the literature, Dr. Hayes concludes that there is a predisposition of the patient who has recently had his tonsils removed to contract poliomyelitis, and that the bulbar type is two to three times as likely to occur in such patients. For this reason, Dr. Hayes states that he will continue his present policy of refraining from removing tonsils and adenoids.

"It has been confirmed by countless surveys that in this area the months when most attacks of poliomyelitis occur are August and September but in the epidemic above mentioned, one fifth of the patient were stricken in October."

"An observer of the Department of Public Health of the City of New York states that the safest time for the removal of tonsils and adenoids as far as poliomyelitis is concerned is January, February and March."

Some physicians believe that boys and girls returning to school from their vacations are so tired that they are more readily stricken with polio. They have less strength and resistance.
