

# Chicago White Sox Win Detroit Defeats Boston

Nothing stops the onrushing Chicago White Sox these days. Not even a pitcher who whipped them five times last year.

The American League leaders made it 10 victories in 12 starts Thursday, defeating Washington Senators 6-1 in the process they ace, to the showers. Stobbs who beat the Sox five times in 1956, lasted only six innings, yielding all but one of Chicago's runs. The most damaging hit off him was Walter Dropo's grand slammer in the sixth that broke up a 1-1 deadlock.

Detroit tripped up the Ted Williams less Boston Red Sox 7-5 to drop Mike Higgins team three games behind Chicago. Gene Stephens, who filled in at left field while Williams was nursing a cold, did his best to tell Ted's shoes. He cracked three hits in three runs, but Tom Brewer was not equal to the task. The Tigers led off on the star right-hander for five big runs in the fourth to practically settle the issue.

**DROVE IN FIVE**

Cincinnati's Don Hoak, swinging a hot bat, stroked four hits including a home run and drove in five runs including the winning two in the ninth as the Redlegs defeated New York Giants 9-7. Hoak's achievement was a complete turnaround from exactly a year ago to the day. On May 2, 1956, Hoak, then with Chicago,

struck out six times in a 17-inning game against the Giants. The Giant loss was achieved despite a league record-tying six doubleplays made at the expense of the Redlegs. Hershel Freeman, third Cincinnati pitcher was the winner with Marv Grisom taking the loss.

**FIRST VICTORY**

The White Sox fourth consecutive victory was the first for Dick Donovan, who finally made it with a five hitter on his third try. Dropo's grand slammer, the sixth of his career, hung the fourth straight defeat upon the winless Stobbs. Minnie Miñoso started the uprising against Stobbs with a sixth inning single. Herb Plews' error on a potential double play grounded, and a walk to rookie Jim Landis set the stage for Dropo's blast.

Charley Maxwell's home run, with two mates aboard, high-lighted Detroit's five-run outburst against the Red Sox. The Tigers added single runs in the seventh and eighth to give young Don Lee, son of former major league pitcher Thornton Lee, his first victory. The 23-year-old newcomer, less than a year off the University of Arizona campus, yielded four runs and eight hits before he was lifted in the eighth when the Red Sox scored their last run.

Night games filled out the rest of the major league schedule, with the exception of idle Cleveland and Baltimore.

## Sugar Ray Doesn't Want To Rush Bout With Basilio

CHICAGO (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson is sitting on top of the world again, but he doesn't want to be rushed into a potential \$1,000,000 match with welterweight champion Carmen Basilio after his stunning knockout of Gene Fullmer.

The re-crowned middleweight champion and his numerous handlers presided at a press conference in his hotel room after Robinson had visited a Roman Catholic seminary in suburban Westmont, Ill.

Earlier surmised that Robinson and Basilio would meet in a mid-July bout, possibly at Yankee Stadium, got a dash of cold water from Robinson.

"It's no good in July," said Robinson without conceding he was anxious to make this big money bout. "Everybody is out of town. You draw better in September."

**WRANGLING OVER TERMS**  
That there will be prolonged wrangling over terms is obvious. Said Joe Glaser, Robinson's "financial" manager: "Basilio must be made to realize that Robinson is holding a royal flush."

George Gardner, Sugar Ray's just plain "adviser," pointed at Robinson and said "this is the world's greatest attraction in boxing."

Glaser said his advice to Robinson is to "relax and rest awhile." Ray's handlers said he has received offers for bouts in England, France and Italy. But all conceded the Basilio match is the only one that will draw money.

Sugar Ray said he thought a right to the body just before was a better punch than the whistling left which knocked out Fullmer in

1:27 of the fifth round at the Chicago Stadium.

**WANT 30-30 SPLIT**  
The Basilio camp got into the act.

"We'll take nothing worse than a 30-30 percentage split right down the middle," chorused Johnny DeJohn and Joe Netro, co-managers of Basilio.

"I wasn't overly impressed," said Basilio. "He (Robinson) can be hit by combinations. I picked Fullmer but I was rooting for Robinson because I thought we'd draw a better gate. A fellow can't stand back and give Robinson punching room. You've got to get inside. It will be a pleasure to lick him."

Basilio still recalls a time in 1952 when he introduced himself to Robinson on Broadway and got the brush off.

About a Robinson-Basilio bout, International Boxing Club President Jim Norris said: "It should be the biggest money fight in many years outside Rocky Marciano's fight with Archie Moore. It could equal or even exceed the Robinson-Randy Turpin rematch hit Wednesday night. While a 1951 that drew \$767,000."

**FULLMER GROVELLED**  
Fullmer never knew what his record of 14,757 had paid \$158,643 roared, he grovelled on the canvas trying desperately to beat the count of referee Frank Sikora.

TORONTO (CP)—Leo Durocher chain-smoked cigarettes and sipped non-alcoholic beverages in his hotel suite, spinning yarns of his major league baseball days with the charm and poise of a regular fellow.

The Lip was so affable, in fact, that somebody wondered aloud why he popped off with that now-famous "nice guys finish last" quip a few years ago. To hear him tell of his days with the St. Louis gashouse gang, the daffy Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants, you would think he was a sadly misunderstood fellow.

"Say, I'm glad you brought that matter up," said the nattily-dressed Durocher, now in a cushy \$2,000-a-year job with the National Broadcasting Company.

**WRONG INFERENCE**  
"I wasn't misquoted," he said. "I was misinterpreted."

"It happened this way. I was managing Brooklyn and this day we were playing the Giants. We were having batting practice and Eddie Stanky was up there taking a cut at a few. Some of the newspaper boys were sitting on the bench with me and one asked what I thought of Stanky."

"I said, 'The guy can't field and can't hit, but he's one helluva ball player. He's always figuring ways to clobber the other guys. He'll fight you down to the ground to beat you. He's my kind of guy.'"

"Just then the Giants are coming out of their dugout and I say 'Take a look at the guy, Mel! Oh, for instance, he's one of the nicest guys in baseball. And look at those guys he's got playing for him. They're making \$40,000 and \$50,000 a year, but they don't give

### Roberts Pitches Phillies To 4-2 Victory Over Cubs

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Robin Roberts scotched talk that he is over the hill with a three-hit, 13-strikeout performance against Chicago Thursday night as Philadelphia Phillies beat the Cubs, 4-2.

Dale Long and Lee Walls, late of Pittsburgh Pirates, made their debut as Cubs by rapping out the only hits off the Phillies ace. Long's fifth inning home run, which arched over the high right field wall, was the first of the year for the home-run hitting sensation of a year ago. It was the first hit off Roberts. Long, who was traded with Walls to the Cubs from Pittsburgh Wednesday, sin-

gled in the ninth. Walls tripped over centrefielder Richie Ashburn's head in the seventh, scoring Ernie Banks, who had reached first on a throwing error by shortstop Chico Fernandez.

Apart from that, Roberts was in top form in winning his first game of the year after three losses. He walked only one man and faced a total of 31 batters, four over the minimum.

Roberts' return to his usual style overshadowed a creditable effort by the Cubs Dick Drott, who struck out six in losing his third game against no wins.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Chicago Cubs, who engineered a four-player deal with Pittsburgh Pirates Wednesday to swapping pitcher Bob Rush to St. Louis Cardinals for shortstop Eddie Kasko and a pitcher.

Wednesday, the Cubs sent a pair of 32-year-olds, third baseman Gene Baker and first baseman Dee Fondy, to the Pirates for first sacker Dale Long, 31, and outfielder, Lee Walls, 24.
