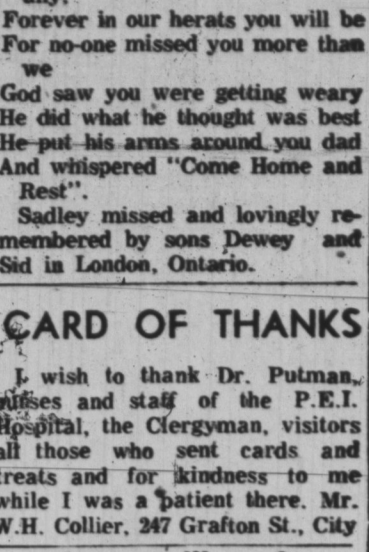

IN MEMORIAM

JOSEPH BELL

The death of Joseph Bell of Murray Harbour occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on December 30th, 1958. The late Mr. Bell was in his 62nd year.

He was the son of the late Alexander Bell and Ellen Hyde of Murray Harbour.

Mr. Bell was a veteran of World War I. He enlisted on the 5th of October, 1914, with the 2nd Siege Battery C.E.F.

He was four years, nine months in the army. He was wounded in 1917. During his 28 months in France he fought in the battles of Ypres, Somme and Passchendaele. He was discharged May 18, 1919.

Mr. Bell resided for some time in Montague and Georgetown, P.E.I., and Essex, Mass., U.S.A.

He is survived by his wife (the former Sarah C. Stewart), of High Bank; son, Roy, grandson-in-law, Leona, and daughter, Joyce, all of Melrose, Mass.; his brothers, Heber and Orrin of Charlottetown; Clifford, Cambridge, Mass.; Robert and Daniel of Murray Harbour.

He was predeceased by sisters Ruth, Lucy and Minnie, also two brothers, Hanford and Rankin.

The funeral service was held from the Murray Harbour United Church with his minister the Rev. L. S. Woolfrey officiating, who paid high tribute to Mr. Bell's kindly disposition and his willingness to help others in time of need.

During the service the hymns sung were: "The Old Rugged Cross", "The Sweet Bye and Bye" and "Beyond The Sunset".

FLOOD TREAT

TORONTO (CP) - The Metropolitan Toronto conservation authority said Wednesday it is hoping for a slow thaw to avert the threat of floods in the Met area. The authority said flood danger has arisen because of extra heavy snowfall in upper watersheds of district rivers and severe cold which has frozen streams and rivers to the bottom blocking watercourses.
