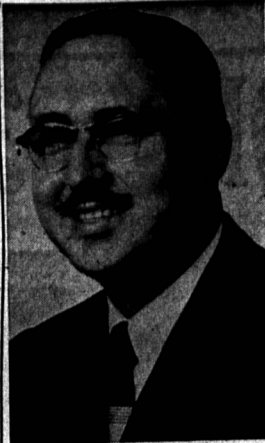




AT PROVINCIAL LEGION CONVENTION

Interesting Program At 2-Day
S'ide Teachers Convention

Mr. Wendell Phillips, St. Eleanor's a teacher at Summerside school, presided over the sessions of the local convention of the P. E. I. Teachers' Federation held Thursday and Friday in the Baptist Church Hall, Summerside. About 170 teachers, including eight new ones, were in attendance. After the minutes were read by the secretary, Mrs. Myrtle Miller, the following committees were appointed by the chair, Mrs. Ernestine Scott: resolutions, Mrs. Doris MacWilliams, Mrs. Thomas Hall, and Mr. E. J. Beck; nominations, Mr. J. R. Murphy, Mrs. Larue Birch, and Mrs. Evelyn Yeo.

In his presidential address Mr. Phillips thanked those who had helped with teachers' workshops in the spring, and said that the findings from these showed that teachers are unanimous in their request for a royal commission on education. It was agreed that a certification board, with teacher representation, should be set up, and that workshops were valuable for discussing Federation affairs and school doings, and for public relations.

He concluded by saying in part "Education, however, is the teacher's most important role. I believe one of the most important ways of teaching youth is by example. Since all children are imitators, the example set by the school-teacher is one responsibility not to be lightly regarded." Dr. L. W. Shaw, director of education, gave a talk and chaired a panel discussion on "Reading". He quoted from a report of U. N. E. S. C. O. that the alphabet system of teaching people to read, which was in common use for many centuries, is no longer being taught in any country in the world. He then explained the various phases through which the method of teaching reading has passed, each one being found to be more satisfactory than that previously used.

BORDEN

Miss Peggy Johnson of Georgetown is visiting in Borden with Mr. and Mrs. W. E. White. as for the use of the hall, were passed. The committee also brought in resolutions against asking teachers to investigate absenteeism for family allowances and in favor of a royal commission on education, teacher representation on the certification board, urging the Department of Education to reduce the number of teaching days similar to that of other Provinces, and in favour of an extra pay cheque for those teachers whose school year begins on or before the middle of August.

Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, chief supervisor, spoke about changes in the curriculum in arithmetic and geography, and proposed changes in the language program. That the need for good handwriting is just as important today as it ever was, was ably demonstrated by Mr. H.B. MacLean, Vancouver, author of the MacLean Method of Writing. He stressed the necessity of a uniformity of letter formation in the primary grades, with a variety of styles introduced for interest value later on.

Since all writing lessons must begin with demonstration, he urged teachers to improve their own handwriting by taking a correspondence course free of charge. Mr. MacLean has a vast fund of wit and humor to accompany his great storehouse of knowledge and experience in teaching, and for nearly two hours he held the attention of his large audience with his interesting lessons interspersed with anecdotes of his school and teaching days on P.E.I. and later in British Columbia, where he taught in the Provincial Normal School for many years.

Miscouche Residents Vote On
Incorporation Question Soon

A plebiscite in regards to the incorporation of Miscouche as a village under the Village Service Act will be held within a month as a result of a public meeting in Miscouche Hall on Thursday evening. A committee of five men was appointed to define the boundaries of the proposed incorporated area and to prepare a petition from the citizens requesting that the plebiscite be held. Members of the committee are: Cyril Gaudet, chairman; George Veno, Jerry Richard, Joseph MacMillan and Regis Gaudet. The present population of Miscouche is said to be upwards of 900, and it was estimated that between three and four hundred of these will be eligible to vote, depending on the boundaries of the area that the committee selects for the proposed incorporation. The meeting, presided over by D.H. Gallant was addressed by Mr. Claude Smith, director of town planning, and by Mr. Arthur Campbell, retired provincial fire marshal. Mr. Smith described the benefits enjoyed by a community organized under the Village Incorporation Act, while Mr. Campbell, who has organized 30 fire departments on Prince Edward Island, said that these have been instrumental in reducing the fire loss in the Province from \$2 million to last year's figure of about a quarter of a million.
