We have a notion that for him, and all who thus delayed have the far side of that water, looking anxiously across its nine miles toward the island and hank will not better appreciate what their promised land was to mean to poor wanderers of history.

Not that our farmer was aimlessly wand'ring. On the contrary when he set forth bright and early after the milking yesterday morning, with a pair of other islanders (who managed the homeward crossing this afternoon) in the little truck, it was on affairs of his farming and with a definite purpose in mind. He would buy according to his plans at a Mainland stock sale and straightway return home then to his April cares.

But now with a perishable load on board, the little vehicle literally paws the pier on the far side there, enduring a halt in the service. "He sent word for Jamie not to try to do everything—just to try to the milking and feeding and suchlike." James observes now over his reading in the old armchair.
