## HOW TO GET MOST OUT OF THE COW.

Jos. Gould, of Uxbridge, Gives Points on Care and Feeding.

### PRACTICAL TALK BY A PRACTICAL MAN.

Regularity and Gentleness Two Prime Requisites—Be Prepared to Feed All Year Round.

[From Farmer's Sun.]

"Dairying for profit?" "Yes," said Mr. Gould in beginning, "I am a crank. I am a crank on other matters than dairying. I am a crank on silos, too. I began turning that crank some years ago, and to-day there are more silos in the county of Ontario than in any other county in the Province, save one." "You turned the crank the right way, anyhow," observed J. C. Sproul.

"Now," Mr. Gould went on, "I am asked to speak on dairying for profit. It is because there is profit in dairying that I am in it. I would not stay in the business two months if there were not money in it. I am satisfied not only with dairying, but with my treatment by the Cannington Creamery, of which I am a patron. The cause of my satisfaction is in my pocket now. (Laughter.) If all the patrons are as well treated, they must be cranks, too, if they are not satisfied."

The "cause of satisfaction," to which Mr. Gould referred was a check for ninety-three odd dollars. This was given him for the cream from 23 cows (nine of them just past two years) produced in October.

### FOUR ESSENTIALS IN SUCCESSFUL DAIRYING.

Then Mr. Gould waded right into his subject. "If," he said, "you wish to make a profit in dairying, you will find four points that must be kept carefully in mind:

- "First, the cow;
- "Second, the man;
- "Third, the food;
- "Fourth, The surroundings.

"The cow. What kind of a cow is she to be? She must be a dairy type. You must have the best sort of machine available for the purpose to be served—the production of butter. Some do not approve of the little 800 pound animals. They want a big frame because they desire to raise calves for beef. They want to run two separate dairies at the same time. Well, if you have large cows, at least, keep them properly. But if you have the dairy cow—the Jersey, Guernsey, Ayrshire or Holsteins—you will find them fit for nothing else, and you must, therefore, make the best out of them in dairying if you are to make a profit from your business.

### DAIRYMEN SHOULD RAISE THEIR OWN COWS.

"I raise my own cows. Out of 39 females in my herd, all but two are of my own reproduction. I raise because I can't buy what I want. Cows require to be educated in order to serve the purpose I wish served; and I find it most profitable to do the educating myself. The cows of my own raising will milk ten or eleven months in the year. The two I bought will go dry in eight months in spite of all I can do. If they did not do well for the eight months I would not keep them. If they had only been educated to milk ten months one of them would be a bonanza. And it is all in education; but this must begin with the first calf. I have one two-year-old that is only giving four pounds a day, but I am keeping on milking her, to establish the habit of continuous milking. A cow should milk for ten and one-half months in the year. I cull out my animals when they reach four years. If they will not give at least 175 pounds of butter at that age out they go. I have culled out fifteen or twenty in establishing my present herd. Where do the culls

go? To the drover and he unloads on the Toronto dairymen who buy their cows instead of raising them.

### ONLY ONE TEST FOR A COW.

"If your cow is right and the other conditions are right, you must make a success of dairying. How are you to know if your cow is right? By weighing the milk every night and morning, year in and year out—by keeping a debit and credit account with the cow. In the herds of the patrons of this factory there are some good cows; there are other cows that are living at the expense of the good ones. In order to find out which are profitable you should have a set of scales in your barn for the purpose of weighing each milking of each cow, and a sheet of paper for the purpose of recording the facts shown by the scales. But weighing alone is not sufficient. The milk of each cow should be tested. Mr. Sproule, manager of the factory, will make the test for you.

### WHERE THE PROFIT IS MADE.

"See the importance of knowing what each cow is doing. It costs \$23 to \$34 a year to keep a cow on full feed, the variation being according to the capacity of different animals to turn their food into milk. The cost of mere maintenance is \$20. Every dollar's worth of feed over that which your cow will assimilate represents profit. If you merely maintain the animal you have no profit; if your cow will take \$5 worth of feed above cost of maintenance it will give a profit; if \$10 worth a greater profit. Keep adding to the feed so long as the cow responds through the milk pail. Occasionally work backwards. If you can reduce the feed without reducing the milk flow you are feeding too much and wasting your substance. A cow should give 250 lbs. of butter on \$30 worth of feed. The best of my cows in '97 gave 413 lbs.; in '98 she gave 409 lbs. She went dry for four months and she has never been as good since. The great majority of the cows of Ontario do not come anywhere near 250 lbs. The average return per cow in this Province, according to Professor Dean, is 125 lbs. It is not hard to figure out how much profit there is in that. Keep a record of your cows, then, and weed out those that are mere boarders.

### NO MULE DRIVER WANTED THERE.

"The man. What of the man who handles the cow? You do not want in a dairy barn a man who has been accustomed all his life to the punching of Texas steers or the driving of Western mules. There must be no loud noise in the dairy-stable. There must be gentleness with dairy cattle. A man who goes about with a damn here and a kick there has mistaken his calling, if he undertakes to handle milk cows. Gentleness pays. A little rub on the back will put a cow in good humor for half a day.

"Something more than gentleness is necessary on the part of the dairyman. There must be promptness as well. The milking and feeding of cattle must be carried on with the regularity of the town clock. We milk at a quarter to five in the summer and a quarter to six in the winter. And the milking is always done in the stable; that is the proper place—winter and summer. (Continued on page 6.)
