top delegates present, including Selwyn Lloyd of Britain and Health Minister Paul Martin of Canada.

Martin was reported among the most outspoken supporters of the resolution, about which Menon had many consultations with assembly president L. B. Pearson of Canada.

U. S. Objections

The U. S. has stated objections to these provisions of the Indian plan:

1. Those prisoners who have not been repatriated 90 days after an armistice would be sent to a political conference already provided for to discuss broader Asian issues. The Americans express concern that the fate of the prisoners is indefinite and urge instead that prisoners be released to go wherever they wish, rather than be held indefinitely by a neutral commission.

2. Appointment of Poland, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland and Sweden to the repatriation commission, along with an "umpire" in case of a deadlock, to take charge of the prisoners. The Americans say this is a one-sided commission with two vocal Communist members and two "neutral" countries. However, backers of the Indian plan, note it also provides that if the proposed commission is not acceptable, each side could choose two countries to act on a commission along with an umpire.

Mr. William Moore, 76, died of a heart attack at his home in Murray River about 7 P.M. last evening. Mr. Moore complained of having a pain in his chest while having supper at the home of his daughter, Mrs. George Campbell, and about a half hour later after reaching his own home, he was found lying on the floor by Mr. Bert Saunders, who regularly visited the deceased.

Dr. M. L. Bonnell was called to the home, and he notified Coroner Dr. G. S. A. Inman. Death was attributed to a heart attack, and there will be no inquest. It was learned that Mr. Moore had been under medical treatment for a heart condition for some years.

The deceased operated the Tip Top Tailor Shop at Murray River, and intermittently for the past ten years has carried the mail from the train to the post office. He was a well known and respected gentleman, and many will learn with regret of his untimely passing.

Surviving him are four children, Ethel, Mrs. George Campbell, Murray River; Rose, Mrs. Cy Penny, Murray Harbour; Roland in Charlottetown, and Foster in Toronto. Also surviving are two brothers, John in Murray River; Joseph in New Glasgow, N. S.; and one sister, Mrs. Margaret Livingstone, Dover.

Funeral arrangements were not completed last evening.

Interment will be in the church cemetery.
