

GOWAN BRAE NOTES.

Most of the farmers about here, realizing the necessity of co-operative dairy farming, are determined to give up the old system of farming. This is a step in the right direction. It would be advisable for the farmers to get the improved breeds of cattle and pigs. The latter can be obtained at a very reasonable price at the Hermanville Farm, Black Bush, where new methods of farming have been introduced by the proprietor, John A. McDonald, Esq., a very skilful farmer, and an energetic school teacher withal.

Mr. White, who does a very large milling and lumber trade, has this year a larger amount of lumber about his mill than any previous year, which shows plainly that he is making great profit in his trade with the St. Pierre market.

Mr. Shepard, who has a saw mill quite near Mr. White's, is doing a very large local business in lumber, principally bows and laths for lobster traps.

Mr. Patrick Mullally, our very efficient cheesemaker, who has been confined to the house for about four weeks with la grippe, is able to be about again.

It is rumored that ere the Provincial elections take place several new bridges are to be built on both sides of the Souris River, and the road opposite Shepard's Mill is to be straightened by the Government. While everyone here wishes to see these works completed, still they do not like the idea of them being done by a Liberal Government, as too much money may be spent in order to appease the appetites of hungry Grits who are kicking.

INTERESTING NEWS NOTES SELECTED FOR THE EXAMINER.

The British cruiser Raccoon, which left Cape Town on February 12, under sealed orders, arrived at Durban unexpectedly during Saturday night with six other British warships. Two more war vessels of the British fleet are daily expected. The object of this naval demonstration is not known.

Captain General Polaviejs, prior to leaving Manila, capital of the Philippine Islands, sent a despatch to the Government at Madrid saying the rebellion is nearly quelled, that only 6,900 insurgents, partly armed, are in the field; that 24,000 insurgents have already submitted to the Spanish authorities, and that 20,000 insurgents are upon the point of yielding up their arms.

The Berlin correspondent of the London Times says that the Russian Minister of War publishes in the Russkij Invalid an order of the Czar providing that hereafter criminals condemned to imprisonment at Siberia shall be conveyed there by rail instead of being compelled to make the march by way of Tomsk and Irkutsk, which has caused so many deaths and much terrible suffering to thousands.

SEASON TICKETS.

Sir,—I wish, through the medium of your paper, to ask the Hon. Fredk. Peters if he really intends to abolish the season tickets on the Hillsborough Ferry. Every spring the Grit Government have threatened to stop these tickets, but after trying it for two or three weeks they would come to their senses, apparently seeing the injustice of such an act. This spring they are out with the old cry, "No season tickets." They do not seem to consider that such an act would be most unfair to the people who live in Southport but earn their living in Charlottetown. For example, two working men, who live here but work in town, coming home to their meals, will be compelled to pay 24c a day fare, or about \$50 for the season. This alone shows the injustice of such a measure and if Mr. Peters persists in doing away with these tickets and oppressing the people in such an outrageous manner, he will get a pretty cool reception "even from his Liberal friends." But although this act, if carried out, will be very hard on the people living on the south side of the river, it may in the long run be a benefit to the entire Island, by helping, at the next election, to return Mr. Peters to the bosom of his family.

THE MARKETS.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that wheat prices have taken a boom as a result of the war in Europe. This continent will make something out of another continent's misery. But oats continue low, the Chicago prices being 17c. Fodder cheese sells readily in Montreal at 10c to 10 1/2c per pound, and butter (creamery) at 18c to 19c. The dairy season has opened in the west. Montreal pork quotations are \$12 to \$13 per bbl. Eggs sell in this city for 8 cts per dozen.
