

VON MOLTKE has been awarded the Grand Prize of Honor by the Berlin Academy of Science, for his History of the Franco-German War, it being considered the best historical work of the last decade. The work has not yet been translated to the English.

THE British Methodist Conference is now in session at London. Rev. E. E. Jenkins, M. A., one of the General Secretaries of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, long a missionary in India, and uncle of our ex-Canadian Agent General, ex-M. P. for Dundee and general satirist, was elected President of the Conference at the commencement of the session.

A WASHINGTON despatch, dated July 30th, says: 1,117 tons of iron and steel were exported to this country from Great Britain during the six months ending June 30th, against 130,000 tons for the same period last year. Exports of cotton goods increased from 26,000,000 yards to 47,000,000. Exports of wool was thirteen times as large as in 1876, and in woolen cloths twice as large. Exports of worsted stuffs increased from 12,000,000 to 29,000,000 yards, and exports of carpets were thirteen times as great as in the first half of 1879. Exports of yarn increased from 562,000 pounds to 3,734,000 pounds; jute manufactures from 24,000,000 yards to 47,000,000 yards; linen piece goods from 44,000,000 yards to 56,000,000 yards. There was an increase of 66 per cent. in value brought over, and 200 per cent. in all other machinery.

SIR BARTLE FREERE, Governor of South Africa, has been recalled. Sir Bartle is a very able man, but the feeling in the Government ranks was too strong against him to hold his position. What makes the feeling so strong against him, is the reckless and bloody war into which he plunged the country with the Zulus. He is particularly blamed for the slaughter at Isandula. Had he acted a prudent part the Zulu war might have been averted. Millions of treasure have been spent and valuable lives have been sacrificed on account of his impetuosity. He disregarded the orders from the Colonial Office in connection with the Zulu war, previous to its outbreak. Many were of the opinion that he should have been recalled then. After the formation of the Gladstone Ministry a large and influential deputation of the Liberals sought his dismissal, and a great deal of dissatisfaction was caused by not dismissing him at once, but Gladstone justified his retention on the ground that he could render valuable assistance towards completing the Confederation of the South African Colonies, a project that the Imperial authorities are anxious to see carried out. As he was very unpopular his dismissal will consolidate the discontented element of a large number of Gladstone's supporters.

THE one hundredth anniversary of the establishment of Sunday Schools was celebrated in St John, N. B., on Sunday last, in grand style. It is estimated that over two thousand children and as many spectators assisted in the celebration. Speeches were made by Revs. D. D. Currie, Dr. Watters, G. W. M. Carey, L. G. Stevens, G. A. Hartley, and a number of laymen. The *Telegraph*, commenting on the celebration, says:—  
"In the British Isles and in this country there has been of late a series of celebrations in honor of the first establishment of a Sunday School by Robert Raikes, of Gloucester, printer, philanthropist, etc. The idea of Sunday School is so simple that it seems strange that it should only be a hundred years old, or that a single individual should be credited with it. In this respect the claim of Raikes resembles that of several inventors and scientists. They may not have been the only persons who made a particular discovery, but it was under them that it was most thoroughly developed. The Rev. Mr. Stock, who was Mr. Raikes' coadjutor; Rev. Dr. Burns, of Glasgow; Catherine Bowin, immediately before the time of Raikes; Joseph Allein, James Heys and Wm. King taught in the same cause before the time of Raikes; Cardinal Borromeo, in the 16th century, and several other persons conceived the idea of Sunday Schools and acted on it to some extent, but it was not until 1780 and the time of Robert Raikes that the idea began to take general hold of the public mind."

Latest News Notes.

Two biblical characters are often mentioned by dry goods dealers when they have a bargain to offer their customers—Job, Lot.

The receipts of grain at Montreal the present season are a million and a half of bushels in excess of the corresponding period of last year.

An American company has bought an iron mine in Cape Breton, where their countrymen already hold large silver, oil and other claims.

The Quebec Bank has announced that after the 1st August it will not pay more than three per cent. interest on deposits, so plentiful is money at the ancient capital.

Halifax, says the *Citizen* is not keeping up its reputation for fine summer weather this year. The month which has just closed has been remarkable for its rain and fog.

The humblest can do something toward making the local paper interesting. If you cannot be a defaulting bank clerk, you can at least step on a piece of orange peel and sprain your ear.

It is stated that the salaries and contingencies of Government engineers and officials connected with the Pacific Railway in British Columbia amount to about \$5,000 per day.

The Quebec police are busily occupied in keeping watch for unlicensed commercial travellers. Scarcely a day passes but some delinquent in this respect, is brought before the Recorder.

177,363 immigrants arrived at Castle Garden, New York, in the six months ended 30th June last, the largest number that ever arrived within that length of time. So says the *N. Y. Post*.

Maine is a great potato raising State, yet with a duty of 15 cents a bushel, our neighbors have found it profitable to export to this country during the past year 1,041,460 bushels of potatoes.—*Bangor Whig*.

Kearney's followers find themselves unable to raise the money to pay the rent of the sand lot at San Francisco, where they have held their meetings, and have moved to public ground near the San Francisco city hall.

Ex-Governor Sprague bought Canonchet, his country seat at Narragansett pier, for \$17,000, and improvements have cost \$640,000. It would not sell to-day for one-tenth its cost. The husband lives there alone, and his wife looks over the place from her rooms at the Tower Hill House.

The importation of wine into France for the first five months of the year went up to 3,681,000 hectolitres, valued at \$140,000,000 francs. Of this quantity, Italy furnishes more than a fifth, instead of a seventh, as did Greece and Spain, three fourths instead of three fifths.

John Williams, Montreal's champion swimmer, was to compete on Saturday with Col. Bond and all comers at La Prairie. It is intended Williams shall go to New York in the fall to represent Canada in aquatic sports there.

Marriageable young men are wanted for boarders at North Conway. At last accounts there were 63 ladies and 7 gentlemen at Wentworth's Thorn Mountain House, about 40 ladies and 2 gentlemen at the Artist Falls House, and 10 ladies and 2 gentlemen at T. C. Eastman's.

The horses in the numerous private stables in Boston and vicinity are suffering from the throat distemper which recently appeared. The muscles of the throat become inflamed, the animal becomes incapable of swallowing, and soon after the muscles of the body are paralyzed, and death ensues. The cause is said to be rainy, irregular weather. No cure can be found.

There was a small earthquake at Ottawa, Ontario, a night or two ago. This is the result of high tariff protection. The duty on earthquakes is so much that it does not pay to import them from South America, and so the Canucks have to depend upon the home made article. Of course the earthquake business is only in its infancy yet in the Dominion, but by and by, when things are fairly established it is expected that the Canada quakes will equal the imported article. There is nothing like fostering home industries.—*Detroit Free Press*.

THE BRITISH NAVY IN CHINESE WATERS.—The *Broad Arrow* is informed that, in accordance with the announcement recently made by Mr. Gladstone with regard to strengthening the British squadron in Chinese waters, the Admiralty have already sent instructions to the Admiral commanding the East Indian station to provide the necessary reinforcements should events render these necessary. It is not the present intention of the Admiralty to send out reinforcements from England.

The *Osservatore Romano* publishes a circular letter of Cardinal Nina, Papal Secretary of State, to various Papal Nuncios in reply to the circular of Frere Orban, Belgian Minister of Foreign Affairs, concerning the publication of documents which passed between Belgium and the Vatican. Cardinal Nina accuses Frere Orban with premeditatedly breaking off relations with the Vatican. He adduces numerous refuting the charge of double-dealing against the Vatican, made by the Belgian Minister, and accuses Frere Orban of having party aims.

The Belgian Academy of Medicine has received a report on the researches made by Dr. Fabre regarding diseases to which coal miners are especially liable. He finds that as coal absorbs rapidly up to 100 times its own volume of oxygen, the air which the miners have to breathe is deprived of oxygen to a hurtful degree. The atmosphere of a mine is further vitiated by the gaseous carbon compounds given off by the slow combustion of the coal. He concludes that a supply of air is more essential than a supply of light, and that even the best ventilated mines need be better ventilated.

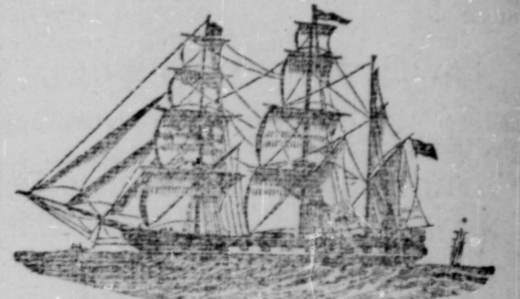
