**OBITUARY.**

It is our painful duty to chronicle today the death of John Gaffney, Esq., High Sheriff of Prince County, which occurred at his residence, on Wednesday, the 1st inst. The deceased was an old and respected resident of Summerside, and one of its most prominent citizens. He had been in failing health for some time, and by the advice of his friends he spent a short time in the Charlottetown Hospital during the past summer, where it was hoped that by the attendance of skillful physicians and trained nurses he might become convalescent. He returned home however, very little benefited in health and has since then continued to sink slowly until the "final hour" came, and although his death has cast a gloom over Summerside, it was not quite unexpected by his family and friends.

The deceased was born in Charlottetown in February 1835, and was consequently in the 65th year of his age at the time of his death. He was educated at the old academy, now known as Prince of Wales College, and in his early life served as a clerk in the store of the late Patrick Walker, of this City. At an early age he left Charlottetown for the United States, and after spending a few years there, he returned to the Island and excepted the position of accountant in the store of R. T. Holman, Esq., Summerside. He remained in Mr. Holman's employ until 1873, when he formed a partnership with the late A. T. Mills under the title of Mills & Gaffney. This partnership was dissolved in 1876 when Mr. Gaffney opened a store of his own in which he continued to do business until 1897.

In 1888 the deceased was appointed United States Consular Agent for Summerside to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Finlay McNeill, Esq. In 1892 he received the appointment of Chairman of the Summerside School Board, and in 1895 the position of High Sheriff of Prince County was conferred upon him. These important offices he continued to fill up to the time of his death, always discharging the duties appertaining to them with courtesy, integrity and ability.

For many years he was President of the Prince County Liberal Association and on two occasions, 1870 and 1876, he offered as a candidate for the third electoral district of Prince. Although unsuccessful he possessed talents which eminently fitted him for a legislator. He was a pleasing and effective platform speaker, a brilliant conversationalist and at public meetings, celebrations or anniversaries no name was more in requisition than his. He was passionately fond of reading, had a very retentive memory and his mind was literally stored with a rich fund of practical knowledge on various subjects, which he was able to use with telling effect in argument or debate.

For many years he was a frequent contributor to the newspaper press. His style was pungent and on controversial subjects his articles sometimes bristled with mingled logic and denunciation, but were always highly prized by the editors, whom he favored with them. He has also written some excellent newspaper stories some of which have appeared in our Island newspapers and others have been thought worthy of a place in some of the leading newspapers of the United States. He was fond of writing, even as an amusement, and had he chosen journalism as a profession he would undoubtedly have excelled in it. Of late years, however, he has contented himself with sometimes writing historic and narrative sketches in which he excelled, and of which his articles on "The Irish Exiles" and "The Expatriation of the men of Barra" which appeared some time ago in the Charlottetown newspapers, may be taken as fair samples. He leaves two sons, the elder of whom is now practising law in Boston, and four daughters to mourn their loss. To these we extend our heartfelt sympathy in their sad bereavement.

**THE GOVERNOR GENERAL ON OUR CONTINGENT**

Speaking at Montreal a few evenings ago Lord Minto said:

As regards the Canadian Contingent for the Transvaal, it goes out because you insisted upon its going, and I am very glad you did so. Its going forth marks a new epoch in the history of this country, and I am proud that Canada is to be represented along with the troops from the Motherland and the Empire's colonies at the seat of war.

"The contingent is a credit to the Dominion. It is a capable force, and will undoubtedly give a good account of itself. If an emergency should arise in the near future demanding the despatch to South Africa of another detachment of troops from Canada, I am sure I am but voicing the sentiments of everyone here when I say that Canada will willingly supply it. (Tremendous applause.)"

**TELEGRAPHIC**

This despatch was yesterday received only in time for the second edition.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The War Office has issued a statement declaring that there is no cause for anxiety.

The report of the disaster published in Paris, Berlin and other places cannot have come from South Africa, as all cable communications have to pass through the hands of a military censor, who would at once report to the War Office any such disaster.

The London Times admits that General White's force is surrounded. It hopes, however, that General Buller can play a waiting game until General Buller arrives with reinforcements.

From Cape Town comes the information that General Buller and part of his staff have left by train for East London, where he boards the Danatier Castle for Durban. This however, is unsubstantiated at the War Office.

Assuming, however, that he has gone to Durban, it indicates a change in the situation as a visit to Durban was not a part of General Buller's plan.

It is not thought probable that Buller will go to Ladysmith alone, and the only explanation is that he intends to take a portion of the Army Corps to Durban and proceed at Ladysmith, which will enable the Natal forces to take the offensive.

In diplomatic circles, it is not thought that the foreign powers will intervene during the progress of the war, but when the final settlement comes they will take a stand in the event of the Boers being finally defeated and the English annexing the new territory. Then the European powers will step in and demand compensations nearer home.

It is rumored that France is already making active preparations, having called out the Army corps located in Algiers.

It is not considered possible here that France has any other destination for this corps than Morocco.

An army order issued this afternoon instructs the proper authorities to mobilize thirty-five battalions of militia on various dates after November 20th.


