### Lockheed Planes For Air Service

MONTREAL, QUE., August 15—Starting today, the Transcanada Air Lines will use Lockheed 14H1 Planes (Super Electras) in its passenger, Mail and Express service between Lethbridge, Calgary, and Ed-

monton according to announcement given out at T. C. A. headquarters, with delivery of the last of the six new four-engine ordered from the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation. T. C. A. now has a fleet of 10 of the big twin engine planes. They will be in service today on the route from Montreal to Vancouver between Lethbridge and Edmonton. The slightly smaller Electras

formerly in service on the shorter routes, are being disposed of to give the T. C. A. complete uniformity of operation and overhaul. The four-engine described as the fastest transport planes of their type, have a cruising speed of 200 miles an hour and a maximum speed of 244 miles an hour. Their cruising range, with normal load is 1,575 miles. All metal, their empty weight is 11,200 pounds. Their two engines generate 850

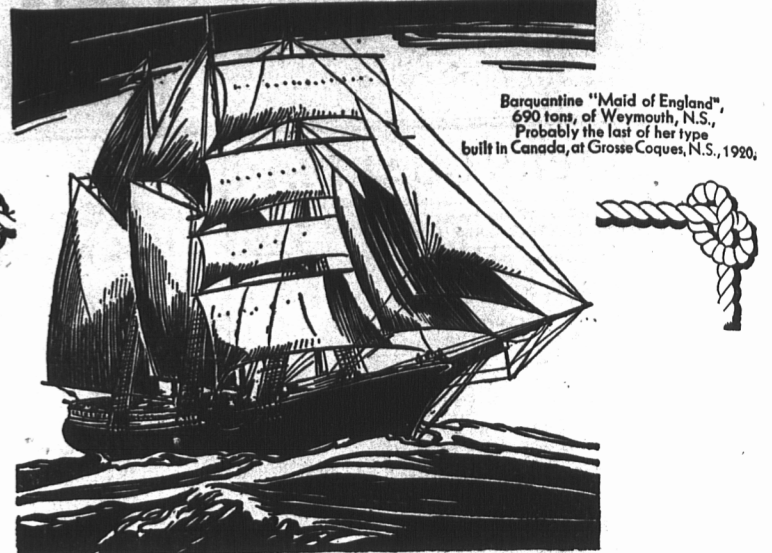

### Spinning and Weaving

Send me your wool to be spun into yarn and woven into blankets. The charges are: 23 cents for single yarn, doubled 26 cents per pound. Blankets cost \$2.00 laundered; and if unlaundered \$1.85.

It takes five pounds of wool per blanket. Wool must be well washed, all burrs and dirt picked out. The size of single yarn medium, and doubled yarn, is fine, medium and coarse, also hooking yarn. Put shipper's name, address, owners name and instructions inside all parcels.

Send by mail or freight. Freight will be paid on 100 pound lot. Price of well washed, dry, picked white wool is 23 cents per pound cash, 14 cents trade. Auto robes, blankets and Fanny Bed Throws for sale.

### Baked Fish Cakes

2 Cupfuls of flaked fish (cooked or canned)  
2 Cupfuls of bread crumbs  
1/2 Teaspoonful of salt  
1/2 Teaspoonful of pepper  
1/2 Teaspoonful of onion  
1/2 Cupful of milk  
Combine the flaked fish, the bread crumbs, the salt, the pepper and the onion juice with the milk. Press into the milk and fish. Press into a moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 1/2 hour. Garnish with parsley or watercress.
