A Modified Programme.

NOT DESIROUS NOW OF OWNING ALL OF CUBA.

Will Be Content With a Little Bit of Porto Rico.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, June 6.—This week is to see the climax of the war, as Santiago and Porto Rico are expected to pass into the possession of the United States.

Against both these places military and naval expeditions of great force are to be directed, and before many days will come news of two notable engagements—both of which, it is expected, will be successful.

On this point President McKinley, who is especially interested in the immediate taking of Porto Rico, has no doubt whatever.

Santiago and Porto Rico must first fall, then if Spain seeks to end the war Havana may be spared bombardment, if not the Cuban capital will be the next object of attack.

Porto Rico is to be the indemnity for war.

Its complete occupation may not be necessary but the flag shall cover at least a bit of its territory.

This is the President's declaration.

There is also certainty that the flag will float over Cuba for a considerable time after war is ended.

SPAIN SEEKING PEACE.

Wants Mgr. Merry Del Val Sent Back to Canada.

MEMBERS LEAVING FOR HOME

A Wavering Government.

OTTAWA, June 6.—The Government's pursuing a wavering policy respecting the retirement of the County Court Judges. It first provided that all the County Court Judges should be set aside at the age of 75. The notice was given that in the event of such compulsory retirement, a judge should receive a pension equal to his full salary. On Saturday, this policy was changed and the further amendment is amended that pensions shall be paid only at the usual rate to retired judges.

On Saturday morning and afternoon, the House of Commons was in supply on the supplementary estimates for the current year.

Sir Hibbert Tupper has gone to British Columbia. Members are pairing and leaving for home every day. But enough will be here on the Opposition side to watch the Government in these last days when attempts are liable to be made to rush through objectionable legislation.

Mr. McDougall gives notice that on Monday he will ask whether Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in October last, addressed a certain letter to Cardinal Rampolla. A copy of the letter is printed on the order paper. It asks that Monseignor Merry Del Val be sent back to Canada as an accredited representative of the Holy See, in order to meet what Sir Wilfrid Laurier calls an "unhealthy agitation against the Catholic work accomplished by Mgr. Merry Del Val."

FLEET OF WARSHIPS.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—The Navy Department has received a cablegram announcing the death at Kobe, Japan, of Captain Charles V. Gridley, of the Cruiser Olympia, Admiral Dewey's flagship.

News Notes.

W. H. Funk, a New York artist, has arrived in Ottawa to accept a commission for the painting of a full length portrait of the Countess of Aberdeen for the National Council of Women.

The owners of the British ship Fosca, which was sunk by the United States cruiser Columbia off Fire Island, N. Y., on Sunday last, will soon present to the Navy Department a claim for damages for about \$250,000.

The earning of the poultry in the United States last year aggregated \$290,000,000. There are said to be in round numbers 375,000,000 chickens and 40,000,000 other fowls, such as ducks, geese and Turkeys, in the United States. In 1897 the hens laid in round numbers 14,400,000,000 eggs. The export price at New York averaged fifteen cents per dozen, which makes the value of the egg crop \$165,000,000. The poultry sold as meat brought \$125,000,000. The hens of America packed inside the shells of their eggs 650,000 tons of water.

HEROISM OF AMERICANS.

Sinking of the Merrimac

EIGHT AMERICANS CAPTURED BY THE SPANIARDS.

The Spanish Admiral Offered to Exchange the Prisoners.

NEW YORK, June 6.—The detailed story of the sinking of the collier Merrimac in Santiago channel has been received. The result was accomplished through the heroism of Lieut Richmond P. Hobson, assistant Naval Constructor, and Daniel Montague, Oscar Reigan, John R. Phillips, John Kelly, and M. Clausen.

All were captured by the Spaniards but the Spanish admiral, in recognition of their bravery, sent word to the American admiral, under a flag of truce, that he was willing to exchange prisoners and assured the American commander that they would be treated with greatest kindness.

Money and provisions have been sent to them and necessary steps are being taken about this exchange.

PORTO RICAN REPORTED SHOT

THE SITUATION AT TAMPA.

Discussing the conduct of the war in Harper's Weekly, Poulteney Bigelow remarks that the war authorities have crowded together in and about Tampa several thousand men on the plausible pretext that in a big camp of this kind the troops could be exercised in large bodies, and the superior officers thus get familiar with brigade and divisional formation. We must bear in mind that most of our troops have never since the civil war been brought together in larger bodies than a few companies at a time. Many colonels of regiments have never until this war seen all their men together on a parade-ground. Brigadier-generals have been created who have never seen the regiments that are to constitute their brigade. We have for this war laid out a complicated scheme of army organization, and instructed the working of it in most instances to men who scarcely know the manual of arms. Let us tell the truth, disagreeable as it is. We are strong enough to bear it, and to profit by it. While the nation has been patriotically voting men and money for this campaign of a "leged philanthropy, promotions have not been made wholly from deserving officers whose lives have been spent in active military work, but from the ranks of politicians, who may have had a smattering of militia drill, or may have worn a uniform forty years ago. Thirty days after the declaration of war there has not been held at Tampa a single military field exercise likely to be of service to generals or brigade or division, let alone an army corps. The main reason is, no doubt, that there are no brigadiers or major-generals in Tampa who would know how to go to work in the matter.
