

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON, June 1. The public debt statement to-day shows a decrease during May of \$10,375,441.19.

CLEARFIELD, Pa., June 1. One thousand miners paraded with a band of music, to-day, held a mass meeting, and unanimously decided to go to work.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 1. A strike began this evening and the rolling mills are closed down, and 1,000 men are out of employment.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 1. The railroads are reducing the force of laborers on account of extreme dullness in business. Over 1,000 men were discharged by the Pennsylvania and Pan Handle roads, yesterday.

CLEVELAND, O., June 1. The Cleveland rolling mill company expect to start up four of their mills on Monday, working half time, and giving employment to 1,500 non-union men secured.

CINCINNATI, O., June 1. The men in all the iron mills of this city, except three, struck work to-day, and are now out.

LONDON, June 1. In the Commons to-day, Mr. Gladstone stated that the Government considered themselves bound to support the present Khedive, because he had, as far as they could judge, behaved with perfect honor and good faith. There was no reason to consider the life of the Khedive or lives of Europeans were endangered. The rumor that the Indian troops were about to be brought to Egypt is without foundation.

Ashamed Bartlett asked if the decision of the conference held at Constantinople would be enforced by arms. Sir Chas. Dilke replied that that was the very question on which the conference was called together.

The House then went into committee on the repressive bill. An amendment offered by O'Donnell, Home Ruler, that commissions for trial without jury be issued by Lord Lieutenant and Chief Secretary conjointly, on sworn information to be communicated to Parliament, was negatived by a vote of 28 to 162.

The race for the Manchester cup of 2,000 sovereigns was won by Ellormeris, formerly Lorillard's, horse Wallenstein.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 1. A prophet who is known to be the leader of a formidable insurrection in Egyptian London has, at the head of a large army, captured several towns. At Senaar he massacred 1,100 persons and forced all European inhabitants to abjure Christianity and become Mahomedans on pain of death. The insurrection is spreading. It is to throw off the yoke of the Sultan as the head of the Mahomedan church.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F. Steamer "Phoenician" arrived at Queenstown this morning, and after landing about 500 tons of freight proceeded on her voyage to Halifax with a large number of passengers for the United States, chiefly Germans.

Barquentine "Nelle," from Liverpool, reports many icebergs scattered along the track of Atlantic steamers.

In 1867, at Confederation, the net debt of the Dominion was \$75,827,641.

In 1873, after six years of Liberal-Conservative rule, it had increased to \$99,848,461.

In 1878, after five years of Grit rule, it had increased to \$140,362,069.

In 1881, the Liberal-Conservatives having been in three years, the total stood at \$155,395,780.

During the first period of Liberal-Conservative rule at the rate of FOUR MILLIONS PER ANNUM;

During the period of Grit rule at the rate of EIGHT MILLIONS PER ANNUM;

And during the second period of Liberal-Conservative rule at the rate of FIVE MILLIONS PER ANNUM.
