

Retired U.S. General Aims Blast At Defence Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Retired Lt. Gen. James M. Gavin has fired new salvos of criticism at U.S. defence policies and levelled an especially heavy blast at his old boss, secretary of Defence Charles E. Wilson.

Gavin, who quit the army last March after public disagreement with actions of the defence department, said Wilson tended to deal with his chiefs of staff "as though they were recalcitrant union bosses."

Gavin's remarks were contained in an article published by Life Magazine in the ex-officer's forthcoming book, War and Peace in the Space Age.

"INFLATED" ARMY OFFICER

Wilson was quick to answer Gavin, who was army chief of research and development.

Speaking from his summer home at Boyne City, Mich., he described Gavin as "just another over-inflated army officer with an exaggerated regard of his ability."

Gavin's retirement at 51 last March stirred up a storm in Congress among legislators who felt the Pentagon had been lax in developing a missile and satellites program. Gavin said he had been hampered by red tape and lack of funds.

Democratic Senator Stuart Symington of Missouri, a former secretary of the air force, said he had read an advance copy of the book and that Gavin's writings "are not those of someone out to get somebody."

LACKING GEAR

Symington said the book

stressed the point that an American army of 15 divisions, many of which are not battle-ready, lacks modern weapons and equipment available to 175 Russian divisions.

In the magazine article, Gavin also says:

"The United States is in mortal danger because of its missile lag, which he predicted would last another three to five years at least. Too much attention has been given to waging global war and too little to small conflicts. He quoted Wilson as once saying the nation 'couldn't afford to fight limited wars. Gavin added: "If we cannot afford to fight limited wars then we cannot afford to survive, for that is the only kind of war we can afford to fight."
