Fire of Three Ships Clears Georgetown Port

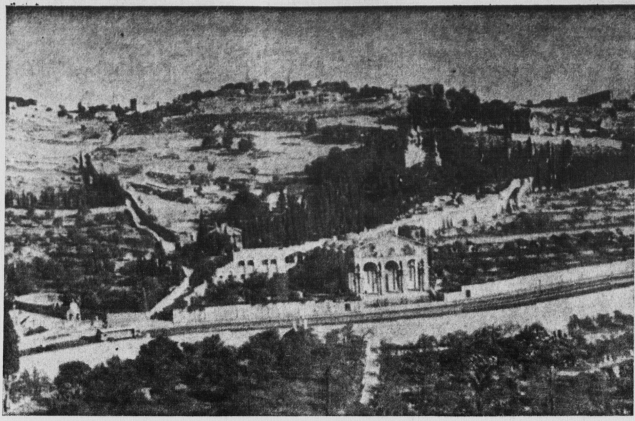
GEORGETOWN — The first of three ocean-going freighters which arrived in Georgetown Christmas Day, cleared port at 5 a.m. Sunday.

The Norwegian freighter "Hera" left here for Mulgrave, N.S. where she will off her cargo of pulpwood.

The loading of the Hera started Friday morning and continued in sub-zero weather and by Saturday evening longshoremen had stowed 550 cords of sappeled pulp logs in her hold.

With harbor pilot, James Llewellyn coming her, the Hera broke her way through the light ice which had formed during the past several days, under calm sub-zero temperatures. Mr. Llewellyn, made no attempt to return to Georgetown by the pilot boat but continued on to Mulgrave with the Hera.

At noon Sunday the Finnish freighter "Atlas" moved from her anchorage in midstream, where she had lain since her arrival Christmas Day, and took over the berth vacated by the Hera at the Railway Wharf. The

Maritime Electric Announces Domestic Power Rate Decrease

Officials of the Maritime Electric Co., Ltd., have announced that starting with the first meter reading after Jan. 31, 1964, a new rate reduction will go into effect, approved by the Public Utilities Commission, for all their domestic customers.

Applying on all power used over the basic 200 kilowatt hours, the decrease is one-half cent per kilowatt hour, from two and one-half cents to two cents. The new rate will be effective for all Maritime Electric's customers in the province, who consume more than 200 kilowatt hours.

The officials point out that throughout its history whenever the company has been able to lower its cost for manufacturing power, its customers have benefited by a rate reduction.

Pointing to the lower rates that the firm has been able to bring into effect over the years, the officials noted that in October 1955, any customer using 400 kilowatt hours of power had a monthly charge of \$15.86, but under the new rate the monthly charge will now be \$11.90.

The origin of this latest decrease in cost actually dates back to 1961, at which time com-

pany officials were faced with the problem of additional generating capacity to meet the constantly growing demand for electricity in the province.

SUBMARINE CABLE

Two methods were considered: a submarine cable linking the local system to the New Brunswick—Nova Scotia grid, or an additional generating unit in the Charlottetown steam plant. The economic study did not show any obvious advantage for either of these alternatives — in other words, one plan could provide power as cheaply as the other.

With no definite financial advantage it became a matter of reliability of supply, and it was decided that a generating source here on the island was more reliable than a source supplied by a submarine cable.

There are many submarine cables which have been installed during the past few years which are giving excellent service. There have been others, particularly in areas of heavy ice conditions, where the results have been far from satisfactory. Accordingly, the decision was made to proceed with an extension to the plant in Charlottetown.

Boston Upters Buffalo Bills

BUFFALO, N.Y. (CP-AP) — Babe Parilli and Gino Cappelletti, both of whom played football in Canada, led Boston Patriots to an upset 36-7 victory over Buffalo Bills Saturday in the American Football League's First Division playoff.

The win broke a tie in the Eastern Division and put the Patriots into the AFL championship game next Sunday in San Diego against the Western Division champion San Diego Chargers.

Parilli passed for two touchdowns and directed a diversified attack against the surprisingly inept Bills. Buffalo had gone into the game as 2½-point favorites.

Parilli, who signed with Ottawa Rough Riders in the Canadian Football League in 1959 after Green Bay Packers put him on waivers, completed four passes to Cappelletti, good for 169 yards. Two of four passes he completed to fullback Larry Garon went for touchdowns.
