Toronto Edges Canadiens In Lone League Contest

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs scored two unanswered goals in the third period Wednesday night to nip Montreal Canadiens 3-2 and prevent the Montrealers from moving into a first-place tie with Detroit Red Wings in the National Hockey League race. Third-period goals by Frank Mahovich and Dave Ellis, both engineered by rookie centre Peter Stelmowski, gave Leafs the win before 14,331 supporters. Johnny Bower playing his third successive win since returning to the Toronto lineup following a rib injury was spectacular for the fourth-place Leafs particularly in the third period when he stopped Montreal's Yvan Cournoyer on a penalty shot.

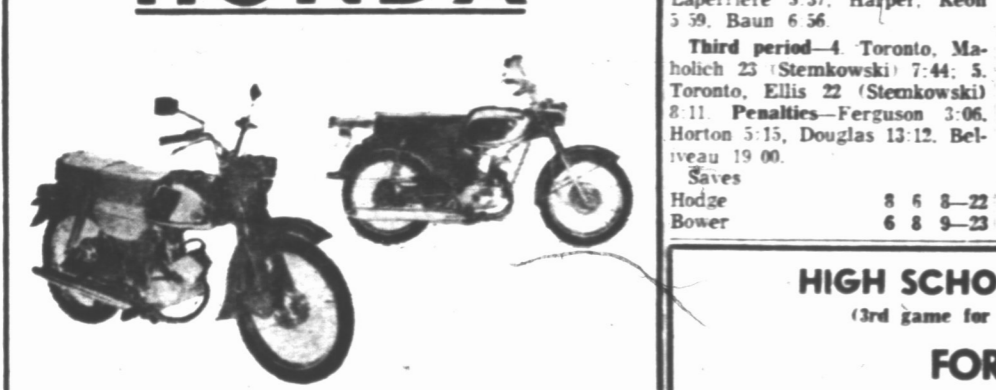
Ken Douglas's second-period goal was the only other Toronto Montreal goal. Bobby Rousseau and Ralph Backstrom, gave the Montrealers a 2-1 lead going into the last period.

But Mahovich's 23rd of the season on a spectacular rush around Montreal defenceman Ted Harris, and Ellis's 22nd just 27 seconds later, turned the tide in Leafs' favor.

The Montrealers weren't dead by any means and threatened several times only to have erratic shooting and Bower's flawless netminding thwart their efforts.
