## Charge Is Laid Against Father

A charge of attempted murder was laid yesterday against Joseph Scully 60 has been remanded until next Wednesday's sitting of Kings County Magistrate's Court in Georgetown on the attempted murder charge. The wounded man is a patient in Charlottetown Hospital, where his condition is reported as critical. However he is given a good chance of surviving the wound in the abdomen.

The accused is alleged to have shot his son, Peter Scully, 25, with a .22 calibre rifle "on or about Dec. 15."

Highlanders and went overseas and served in Italy with the Cape Breton Highlanders. On return he served with the

Reserve Army until about two years ago. A well known and liked member of the branch he was elected vice-president last year.

Other officers elected were: vice-president, M.B. Fitzpatrick, Murray River; second vice-president, Miller Matheson, of Victoria Cross; Athol Robertson, secretary treasurer and A.E. Sullivan, assistant secretary treasurer.

Approximately 50 members were in attendance at the meeting.

## Son-in-Law Heads Team

Dr. Gustave Gingras, head of the Canadian medical team which will treat the 10,000 Moroccans paralyzed by aviation oil, left Montreal for Europe yesterday to consult heads of 11 other national teams taking part in the operation.

Dr. Gingras is the son-in-law of the late Roy C. McLean of Souris, his wife being the former Rena McLean.

The remainder of the Canadian Red Cross team will leave Dec. 21 for Rabat, Morocco. It consists of another doctor, and four physiotherapists. It will join the international medical unit in Morocco to try to relieve the many victims of the aviation oil which was mixed with cooking oil and sold as such. The paralyzed victims are mostly poor people to whom the mixture was sold more cheaply than regular cooking oil.
