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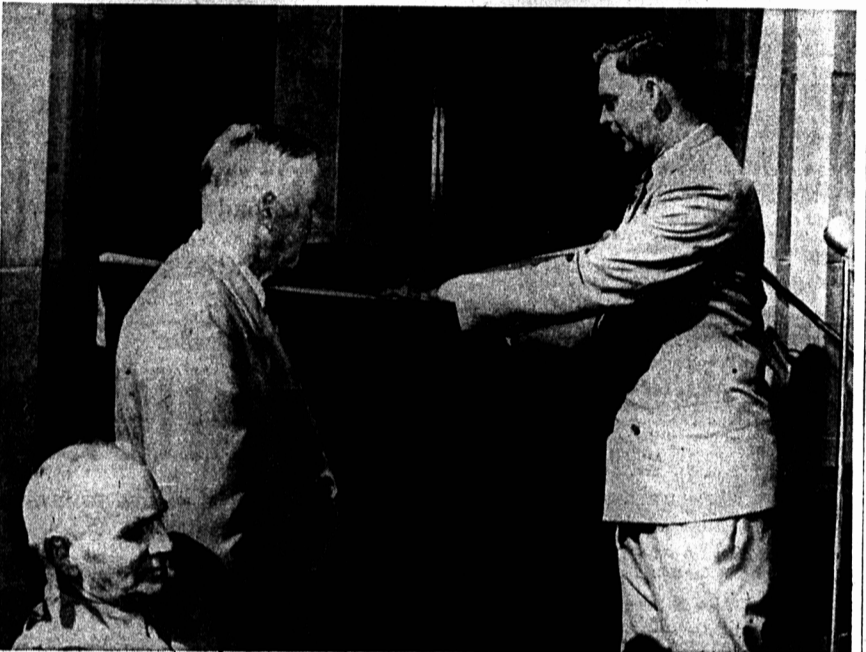
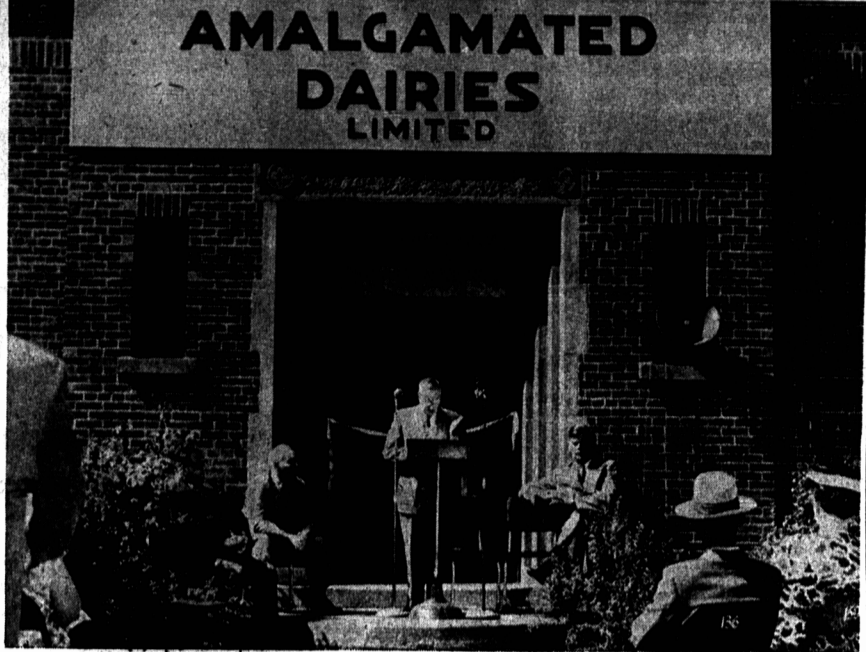

Record crowds invaded the business district of Summerside Thursday and Friday to take advantage of the mid-summer bargain buys offered by many of the town's stores and today is expected to be another "big one" as store closing time tonight winds up this three-day buying spree.

The store of R. T. Holman Ltd. is holding an annual celebration, with its 97th anniversary sale attracting huge crowds, as is Summerside's other large department store, Smallmans Ltd., with their annual mid-summer clearance sale, both of which reported record opening day sales.

Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. Plant At S'side Officially Opened Yesterday

President Murdock MacLeod presided at the ceremonies which officially opened the recently completely renovated plant of the Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. in Summerside yesterday afternoon.

Briefly he reviewed the steps which had been taken towards amalgamation of the various factories which now constitute the company under the management of Mr. John S. Wright. He spoke of the difficulties of early day transportation of products to the factories when a trip of ten or twelve miles was something fraught with many difficulties.

The motor car, he said, has changed all this and carriers may now make and do make trips up to one hundred miles daily without difficulty. He referred to the great assistance received from both the Provincial and Federal Governments and stated that this assistance had made the present Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. a possibility. For without such aid it would have been impossible to have the fine building and equipment.

Mr. MacLeod read a number of congratulatory messages received from other dairies and companies all expressing a hope for the future success of the new venture. Mayor Henry Wedge extended a civic welcome to all those present and to the Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier of Prince Edward Island and expressed the hope that he would soon return to Summerside.

"This is a most important occasion," he said, "one of the most important in the life of our town and for the dairy farmers in this vicinity. It is a good thing for the town and I hope you will find in Summerside the facilities suitable for your needs."

Mayor Wedge congratulated all those who were responsible for bringing a dream into a reality, for their courage and fortitude in going ahead with such a difficult project. Business today, he said, can survive only by using modern methods and that applies to the dairy business as well.

Congratulations were extended also by Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture to those who possessed the initiative, perseverance to form the Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. He reviewed briefly the steps taken towards amalgamation of the different companies.

"Centralization, whether we like it or not," he said, "is the order of the day."

Premier Matheson cut the ribbon across the front door of the plant and officially declared the Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. open to the public. He reminded his audience that this was not the first occasion on which he had come to Summerside officially as a minister of the crown. He recalled with pleasure the occasion on which the Prince County Hospital had been opened when he had been present. He said that he felt that the farmers of this district would find that the dairy was a good thing for them.

Says Dairymen Won Great Victory In Legislation

Speaking last night at the banquet held in connection with the official opening of the Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. in Summerside, the guest speaker, Mr. J. J. Creighton of Tatamagouche, president of the National Dairy Council, in dealing with the threat in this country of margarine, said: "You will recall that just over a year ago our industry was faced with one of the most critical situations in its history. I refer to the extremely vulnerable position in which we found ourselves at that time as a result of a lack of adequate legislation in the provinces to prevent what undoubtedly would have been a near fatal blow to one of the most important branches of agriculture - namely the replacement of milk fat by imported vegetable oils in ice cream, cheese, evaporated milk, cream and fluid milk itself."

"It is with genuine gratification that we note the subsequent enactment of appropriate legislation on this question by each province in Canada. It is to the lasting credit of the major political parties in our province that this legislation was approved with almost unanimous support. It is, I believe to the lasting credit of our council, and the dairy farmers of Canada also that the potential dangers of the situation were recognized and that in close co-operation with the Provincial Dairy Association the facts were presented to our provincial governments before it became too late."

Mr. Creighton said that the danger has not, however, been entirely removed. In fact it has just begun. The vast international oil interests with millions to gain are recovering from the severe but temporary setback and are planning new strategies which they hope will prove more effective in the inevitable legislation battles the future holds.

Mr. Murdock MacLeod, the president of the company, presided at the banquet and called upon Mr. W. J. Reid to introduce the various speakers. The Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier of the Province, said that after looking over the plant yesterday he did not feel that the shareholders ever have to come to the government for assistance. "You are only starting," he said, "and you have many things yet to work out to aid the dairy farmer."

Others who addressed the meeting were Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Donald MacDonaid, president of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture, Mr. Amos Hubley, president of the Prince Edward Island Dairymen's Association and director of the Dairy Farmers of Canada, Mr. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the Federation of Agriculture and of the Dairy-men's Association.
