goal to attain a combination of three things— (a) A greatly increased population; (b) A substantial expansion of industry; and (c) Reduction or elimination of our public debt.

The first would appear to be almost a corollary of the second. Last year I urged before this House a demand for a survey by the Federal Government of economic and geological resources of the Province which might be capable of successful exploitation.

Through the efforts of the Minister of Industry & Natural Resources such a survey has been agreed to and will commence this year continuing over a period of two years.

We have good reason to believe that the results of such an examination will reveal many industrial possibilities. And, again may I reiterate what I said last winter, that if and when we do, let us chart our course based on the firm conviction that growth and expansion is possible, that it should be attractive to our investing public and that it can provide the outlet for the native genius and ability of our youth.

With a greatly expanded population and with developing industrial potential the sources of provincial revenue will be broadened and their incidence less directly felt by our primary producers.

Fiscal Year Ended March 31, 1952 Our public debt as of March 31st, 1951 was \$15,564,569, and the first charge against our income was the amount necessary to service this debt, namely \$1,101,959.

It can readily be seen, therefore, that a recession of debt increases would eventually lead (a) to a complete starvation of the public services, or (b) further and more complete dependence on federal subsidies and grants to supplement our revenue. I will frankly say that trend should not and cannot be allowed to continue.

One of the new 50' trawlers, completed last year, is to be used by the Department this coming season for experimental purposes.

After extensive patching some 33.4 miles of seal coating was applied to existing pavements; By using a Seaman Mixer 18 miles of a 3" experimental road mix pavement were completed; 8.6 miles of the usual asphalt and stone chips of light pavement were also completed; 36 miles of pavement marked with a white centre line; and 210 miles of road brush sprayed with a quick killing preparation.
