John L. Lockhart Buried Yesterday

The Benevolent Irish Society from citizens of all classes in Charlotte town, and never in the history of the organization has it stood higher in esteem for its acts of charity than at present.

The Benevolent Irish Society, one of the oldest Societies in Canada, was established in Charlottetown in the year 1825. The main objects of the Society are the relief of the indigent of all denominations and the promotion of friendship and unity amongst Irishmen. The most important work of this Society, for many years, has been of a charitable nature, and no worthy cause has ever been overlooked by this grand organization.

FIRST PATRON "The Prince Edward Island Register", newspaper of May 6th, 1825, refers to the establishment of the Society at a meeting held at the Wellington Hotel on April 18th, 1825 and the overtures made to Lieut. Governor, His Excellency, Lieut. Col. John Ready to "Sanction and approve". His Excellency forthwith "highly approved and will have much satisfaction in becoming the patron, and of affording every support in his power to the object thereof".

The first executive of the B.I.S. consisted of: Patron, His Excellency, Lieut. Col. John Ready, Lieut. Governor of Prince Edward Island, President, Fidei Coff, Esq., Vice President, Francis Longworth, Esq. Treasurer, Rev. Father Fitzgerald, Secretary, Charles DesBrisay.
