Headline the government delegation was provincial secretary J. David Stewart who acted in the absence of Premier Walter S. Graham Rogers, director of transportation; Minister of Industry and Natural Resources Leo Roussier, travel bureau director, George Fraser, director of town planning, Tante Smith.

The meeting centred around problems facing transportation on tourist trade, and offered some suggestions and modifications.

With the addition of the new MV Confederation this spring, a problem in docking facilities has been created. When the summer schedule takes over, three ferries will be running the same route. With two boats at Cape Tormentine and only one at Borden, a bottleneck of ferry traffic is created. Some discussion was held on the matter of a new pier being constructed at Borden, but this was yet indefinite.
