Mr. Gerry Rea-Airth, editor of the news letter "The Helping Hand" advised the meeting that the second edition had been mailed. Mr. Rea-Airth expressed the hope that the Helping Hand was achieving its goal in providing informative, and interesting news with regard to mental retardation.

Mr. St. John reported that the tag day had been very successful and thanked all those who had worked so enthusiastically. It was decided to put a "Thank You" notice in the paper to express the sincere appreciation of the Association to the businessmen and citizens of Charlottetown and vicinity for their generous support.

Miss Mona Wilson, supervisor of Public Health Nurses, stated that most of the Public Health Nurses had some training in mental health and were very interested in doing what they could to aid the mentally retarded.

4 Cases Heard At Georgetown

Four cases were disposed of in Magistrate's Court at Georgetown yesterday by Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet.

A Gaspereaux resident, who had previously pleaded not guilty to a charge of care and control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated, and in whose case the evidence for the Crown was taken one week ago, had his case continued. The accused in this case did not give evidence himself or call witnesses. He was found guilty and sentenced to ten days in jail.

A Charlottetown resident and a resident of Cardigan were each fined \$20, and costs for having liquor in their possession in other than their residences.

A resident of Brudenell was reprimanded under the Highway Traffic Act for operating a motor vehicle with a beginner's licence without having a licensed operator with him.

Break Up Former Cunard Liner

London (CP)—After a 33-year career at sea the former Cunard liner Ascania is being broken up at a shipbreaker's yard at Newport on the Bristol Channel. The vessel was sold to the shipbreakers last November.

Observers here recall one of the Ascania's proudest moments, when she came to the rescue of the tramp steamer Usworth in mid-Atlantic in 1934. En route from Montreal to Queenstown, the gear had been put out of commission in a mid-Atlantic storm, and at midnight, December 13, she radioed for help.

The Ascania, 100 miles away, changed course, arriving at the Usworth at 8 a. m. Though the seas were still rough, and the

A clean record of 100 per cent freedom from accidents to or infractions of safety rules by children between the ages of six and 12 resulted in "Elmer Safety Plaques" being presented to all six Charlottetown public schools. This 10-month record may not be equalled in Canada and cannot be bettered. Members of the Charlottetown Junior Board of Trade headed by their chairman John H. Morris and Staff Sgt. A.J. Dowling of the Charlottetown Police Dept. made the presentation.

"It is heartening to know," said Mr. Morris, "that the boys and girls in grades one to six are setting example for the younger and older children and in many cases for parents."

F.A.S. Jones, honorary chairman of the program which has many co-sponsors said that he was very proud of each pupil. He urged them to keep Elmer and the five safety rules in mind during

the summer months. Besides the plaques, some 1,400 crests were distributed showing Elmer, the safety elephant and the safety rules.

Mr. Morris pointed out that a record of each class will be kept during the summer for infractions of the safety rules. The Junior Board of Trade will take further steps in September to see that every child is taught the Elmer Safety Rules.
