The barber, on the other hand, has entered a suit for \$5,000 for slander, against his customer.

VICE ADMIRALTY COURT.—The Heather Belle-fastnet case was continued last afternoon and to-day. Yesterday afternoon Harbor Master Small, Capt. McLean, of the Heather Belle, John McLeod (first officer), Joseph Ryan (seaman), and Master George Ryan (passenger), were examined. Up to adjournment to-day, John D. McLeod (engineer of the Heather Belle), James Lee (seaman), Archibald McLean (keeper of the Blackhouse Light) and his son George McLean, and William S. Pook and John D. Schurman, passengers on the Heather Belle at the time of the disaster, were examined.

STATE OF INDIANA.—The steamer State of Indiana, which left New York for Bristol, Eng., on Christmas Day, arrived at London on the 2nd inst., in distress, and reports: On the afternoon of Dec. 29 encountered a strong southeast gale, which shifted to south-southwest and northwest, accompanied by tremendous seas, lasting for three days, during which the steamer's cargo shifted, causing a heavy list to port. The pumps were choked with grain and the vessel leaked somewhat. Her decks were swept of all movable. She will probably discharge her cargo here while being repaired. A portion of the cargo is thought to be damaged.

VALUABLE DISCOVERY.—The discovery of a valuable deposit of plat is reported from the north-west Miramichi, about 20 miles from Newcastle. It is 96 per cent. pure oxide of iron and Mr. Brunell, of the Dominion geological survey, who recently examined these deposits, says there is nothing like them known to scientists. SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Disasters of the Deep. LONDON, Jan. 7. An unknown vessel was wrecked in Papa Sound, Shetland Islands, on Sunday night. It is feared that everybody was lost. Some wreckage drifted ashore, including a piece bearing the letters "A. L."

The steamer Catalonia, at Queenstown, from Boston, reports Jan. 5th, lat. 51 N long. 18 W, passed a sailing vessel on fire. The Catalonia could find no trace of her crew.

Blaine Ill. WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. Mr. Blaine was taken suddenly ill yesterday at his office. The alarm was given at first, but subsided when the Secretary was reported entirely out of danger.

Canadian Trade. OTTAWA, Jan. 7. Despatches from the Colonial Secretary in London bear out the statement that up to the first of July next Canadian trade stands in Cuba and Porto Rico on the same basis as the United States.

United States Politics. BOSTON, Jan. 7. A. S. Pinkerton has been chosen President of the Senate, and Hon. W. E. Barrett Speaker of the House.

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 7. Senator Sherman has secured the Republican nomination.

Lagrippe in Halifax. HALIFAX, Jan. 7. Lagrippe is pretty prevalent here. There was one death from the disease yesterday. Five of the city Presbyterian ministers are confined to their houses by illness.

Killed in the Woods. PICTOU, Jan. 7. John W. McDonald, while chopping in the woods, was killed by a tree falling on him.

Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, Jan. 7.—10 a. m. Strong winds and gales, easterly shifting to westerly, cloudy with snow or in southern portion sleet or rain.

General Telegraphic News. MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—Mr. Lagris, liberal member for Maskinonge, was unseated today for corrupt practices by agents.

OSHAWA, Ont., Jan. 4.—James J. Davidson, Liberal M. P. for South Victoria, walked the plank to-day, his seat being declared vacant on account of corrupt practices by agents.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 5.—A special from Regina says: "The Leader to-morrow morning will publish charges against Minister of Interior Dewdney, the result of which it is claimed by Davin will drive him from public life. The charges relate to the selection of Regina as the capital of the Northwest in 1882, out of which it is charged Mr. Dawdney made money."

MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—It is reported that Archbishop Fabre, during the New Year's visit of his clergy from the Montreal Diocese, gave them clearly to understand that the honor and reputation of French Canada could only be vindicated by Count Mercier's defeat.

LONDON, Jan. 4.—Advices from Pahang, the capital of the state of that name on the Malay Peninsula, show that the rising among the natives began in that state on Dec. 24th last and became general. The British residents and the Sultan, with a strong force of Malays, have gone to suppress the revolt. The trouble is attributed to local hostility to the Sultan.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 4.—The Free Press publishes to-day a five column letter from John S. Ewart, Q. C., a prominent liberal, to Premier Greenway, assailing his school legislation both as regards legality and equity. Ewart, who is a Protestant, contends that the Catholics are justly entitled to separate schools.

QUEBEC, Jan. 4.—Great interest is felt here over the unearthing of the McShane scandals by Hon. G. Nantel at Ste. Therese. It is stated that a big dinner which McShane was supposed to have given on St. Patrick's night when he was minister, was paid for by government contractors, the same parties also paying the heaviest part of the gold watch and chain which the workmen of the Quebec were alleged to have given the people "Jimmy."
