IN MEMORIAM
JEREMIAH GALLANT
Mr. Jeremiah Gallant, a prominent and respected resident of Mont Carmel died in the Prince County Hospital, Summerside, on Thursday, February 23 at the age of 77 years. Mr. Gallant was in his usual good health when he suddenly developed a heart attack. Medical aid was summoned and it was decided to take him to the hospital the following day where he peacefully passed away after having been admitted only a few hours to that institution. He was visited by his pastor Rev. Father Buote, parish priest of Mont Carmel. Also Rev. Father Joseph LeClair of Summerside who administered the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church of which he was a faithful member. The remains were transferred to his late residence at Mont Carmel from whence the funeral took place on Monday morning to Our Lady of Mont Carmel Church at 10 o'clock. The funeral mass was sung by his son the Rev. Emmanuel Gallant who also performed the last rites at the grave. He was assisted by the Rev. Charles Palmer RAO as sub-deacon. Rev. Father Buote also assisted in the sanctuary. The funeral cortege was followed by a large number of friends and relatives. A remarkable fact perhaps unique is that he carried with him to the grave the same rosaries that were given to him when he made his first holy communion at the age of 10 years. Mr. Gallant was widely and favorably known not only in the community where he lived but in many parts of the Island. He was of a kind and genial disposition and always met his many friends and relatives with a glad welcome. His wife predeceased him by almost two years. He leaves to mourn and cherish his memory five sons and three daughters. The sons are Rev. Emmanuel, Gallant, C.J.M. of Sacred Heart University, Bathurst, N.B., Levi and Sylvain of New York City, Aubin and Ben at home. The daughters are, Mrs. Ovidia, Mrs. Joseph of Cape Egmont, Mrs. Joseph Gallant of St. Nicholas and Mrs. Michael DesRoches of Tignish; one sister in the United States and one brother in Alberta; also many grandchildren. The pallbearers were Ovidia Arsenault, Theodore Richard, Henry Gallant, Michael DesRoches, Joseph Gallant and Clarence Gallant. May his soul rest in peace.

Former Islander Dies in Hollywood

The Hollywood Citizen-News reports the death of Dr. H. MacArthur, Baptist Minister and formerly of Prince Edward Island. At the time of his death Dr. MacArthur was pastor of the Eagle Rock Baptist Church in Hollywood, California, and was associated with his son, Dr. John P. MacArthur, in the gospel broadcast, Voice of Calvary. Born in Summerside, P.E.I., Dr. MacArthur was educated at Prince of Wales College, later taking a doctorate in theology at Bob Jones University, Greenville, S.C. At the time of his death he held official positions in various Evangelical organizations as well as being a director of the Conservative Baptist Foreign Missionary Society. Surviving Dr. MacArthur in addition to his son, are his widow Mrs. Olive MacArthur and a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Turner of Glendale, California.

Red Cross Outposts Bring Medical Aid To Remote Areas

TORONTO, March 13—East from Archibald on Cape Breton Island, across Canada to Kyuquot on the West Coast of Vancouver Island stretches the chain of 78 Red Cross Outpost Hospitals and Nursing Stations that bring medical aid to Canadians in the remotest areas. A total of 82,654 men, women and children were served by Red Cross nurses during 1949. Miss Helen McArthur, national director, announced today as the year's reports flowed into headquarters. Outpost nurses gave 136,999 days of hospital care, treated 65,299 patients in hospital clinics and homes, inspected 16,755 children in rural schools, assisted in the birth of 4,117 babies at home and in hospital. More than 6,100 operations were performed. Twelve new Outpost Hospitals and Nursing Stations were opened during 1949, while at the same time, Red Cross withdrew from six communities. "This is in line with the Red Cross policy of community co-operation," Miss McArthur said. "When a community grows large enough to support its own hospital, Red Cross withdraws and concentrates its energies on helping new and smaller communities to get the medical aid they need." Hospital, medical and nursing services in Canada will take nearly one-fifth of the 1950 budget of \$5,000,000 for which the Canadian Red Cross Society is campaigning this month.

Educators Want English Spoken C-l-e-a-r-l-y

HARTFORD, Conn. —(UP)—Educators want Connecticut children to learn how to spell c-l-e-a-r-l-y. A campaign was being mapped today to develop not only better diction, but also a greater ease in speaking with well-modulated voices. State Education Commissioner Finis E. Engleman announced that he has appointed 11 educators to serve on a committee for speech improvement. The committee will inaugurate a teacher-training program in teacher's colleges and the university of Connecticut and will provide training for teachers already teaching in Connecticut schools. The group also will seek to make the "general public aware of the need for general speech improvement," Engleman added. Named to the committee were: Adam M. Altchison, Danbury State Teachers College; Ruth J. Bradley, Willimantic State Teachers College; Dr. Herbert E. Fowler and Brobury P. Ellis, Teachers College of Connecticut, New Britain; Geraldine E. (Continued from page 6) nothing to say. I am not in the habit of condemning my fellow men. But for my part I couldn't and wouldn't take part in sport on Sundays." Prince Edward Island is outside of the H. C. curling bonspiel, but two of the members, James Leater Douglas of Queen's and T. J. K. Kichham of King's are active players in the House of Commons bowling league which operates on week-days only. On the same team as the Prince Edward Islanders are Lionel Conacher, Liberal member for Toronto-Trinity and one of the greatest athletes in Canada's history, and William "Bucko" McDonald, Liberal member for Muskoka-Parry Sound, Ont. former star defence player of the New York Rangers and the Toronto Maple Leafs before entering political life. Curlers are exclusively from the Maritime and Western Canada since Ontario and Quebec members go home every week-end, and have their home town curling rinks at their disposal. Participants say the "roarin' game" has done much to improve understanding between members of different parties and coming from different parts of the Dominion. Politics makes strange bedfellows, but so does the Commons Curling Bonspiel. One of the rinks is a combined CCF-Social Credit aggregation and is skipped by Ross Thatcher, CCF member for Moose Jaw, who, though a Socialist in politics, is proprietor of a chain of hardware stores in Moose Jaw and the adjoining district. Two of the rink are C.C.F.'ers from Saskatchewan and the other two Social Crediters from Alberta. No cabinet ministers are with the curling group, but among its stars are W. G. (Gib) Weir, chief Liberal whip and Leslie Mutch, Liberal member for Winnipeg South and parliamentary assistant to Veterans' Affairs Minister Gregg.

(Continued from page 1) "I looked up," said Vivian Newman, "when I heard a roar of the aircraft engines, and it was coming so low that my brother Thomas and I were frightened and ran away. We thought it was going to hit us. "Then as the engines cut out and the plane passed no more than 20 feet above us, it crashed into the ground and broke into pieces. There was no fire. "We immediately turned and ran back to the crash. As we did so one man jumped out with his head covered with blood crying 'help, get the others out.' "We went to the plane and with the help of other villagers we started carrying out the men. Those we found were in a bad way, but they still appeared to be alive. "Soon about 40 ambulances were at the scene. Ideal Weather The crash — in ideal weather conditions — wrote another chapter in the ill-fated history of the Avro Tudors which were withdrawn from regular British airline service after two were lost on the South American airway route over the Atlantic in 1948 and 1949. Two Tudors Disappeared The first of the missing Tudors, Star Tiger, disappeared between Azores and Bermuda in January, 1948, with 25 passengers and a crew of seven. A year later, in January, 1949, the second one, Star Ariel, was lost without a trace between Bermuda and Kingston, Jamaica, with 22 passengers and a crew of seven. The Avro Tudor which crashed Sunday belonged to Fairflights Limited, a charter service headed by Air Vice-Marshal Donald Bennett, famous wartime "pathfinder" pilot of the R.A.F. Though built to carry a normal load of 40 persons, officials said it could carry many more on a short flight such as that from Dublin to Wales. The accident overshadowed in numbers of dead the "black Christmas" crashes of Dec. 25, 1946, when three airliners were trapped by fog and crashed at Shanghai, China, killing 70 and injuring 16. The previous record death toll in a commercial aviation accident was the 56 people killed Nov. 1, 1949, when an Air Canada plane plunged into the Potomac river at Washington, D.C., after colliding with a Bolivian-piloted fighter plane. The ill-starred history of the Tudor aircraft began in August 1947, when the plane's designer, Roy Chadwick, died in a test flight. Air Vice-Marshal Bennett, 35, who resigned as head of British South American Airways in 1948 during the controversy over the future of the Avro Tudors, refused to have his confidence shaken in the big planes even though they were grounded for a time. They were Britain's first post-war four-engined commercial aircraft. He flew from London to Cardiff to take charge of his company's investigation of the crash. He informed the charter company, Fairflights Limited, after his resignation from B.S.A.A. and, using Tudors, made more than 300 flights on the Berlin air lift. British used chartered air liners to help her air transport division in the air lift. Later, Bennett operated an air line between Yemen and Israel, using Tudors. One of these was badly damaged by Egyptian anti-aircraft fire last October when it ditched off course while flying displaced persons over Egyptian territory.
