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Georgetown Film Council Organized

"A meeting of delegates from ten organizations and a number of interested citizens met in the Legion Hall on Friday, March 13th and completed the organization of the Georgetown Film Council.

Mr. Stanley McInnis of the National Film Board was in attendance and under his guidance and supervision the business of organization and by-laws was completed. The council president, Rev. W. A. Paterson, occupied the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, Miss Genevieve Soloman and moved adopted.

Ten organizations were represented and the majority of those have committed themselves to a definite cash donation towards the purchase of a projector for the Council. Many of the organizations have already placed their permanent member on the Council.

Several other bodies, who have signified their approval of the Council's formation, have not held their monthly meetings and hence have not set the amount of their contributions or named their permanent delegate to the Council.

Very generous cash donations were received from the Holy Name Society of St. James Church and from the Catholic Women's League, who for the present are not taking representations on the Council, as those organizations at present have an excellent projector to supply their requirements. Their contributions therefore towards the Council's costs of obtaining a projector and their interest in the educational benefits to be derived by the school, are to be highly commended.

Organizations represented at Friday's meeting were the Town Council, the Y.P.U. of St. David's United Church, the Community Welfare League, the School Board, the Canadian Legion, the Home and School Association, the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion, the Women's Association of St. David's Church, the Men's Club of St. David's Church and the Masonic Order.

At a previous meeting three officers of the Council were appointed and those officers were confirmed at Friday's meeting. They were: president, Rev. W. A. Paterson; secretary, Miss Genevieve Soloman; treasurer, Mrs. Edward Easton. At Friday's meeting Mr. Howard MacLean was appointed vice president.

A projector has been ordered purchased by the Council and its delivery is anticipated in the very near future. on government-owned railways due to start hearings in the next few days.

Deficit in 1951

The C.N.R.'s 1952 surplus compared with a deficit of \$15,000,000 in 1951, the last year before Parliament lifted a heavy debt burden off its back by transforming fixed-interest securities held by the government into preferred stock of which the company pays dividends as the money is available.

Retrospective wage settlements recently negotiated with trainmen and firemen came too late to be included in 1952 accounts, though the \$4,500,000 in back pay extends to April, 1952.

Apart from record over-all revenues last year, the company reported peak freight business—the mainstay of its income—on its more than 24,000 miles of line.
