Improvements To Be Made To Church Hall In Kensington

A well attended meeting, chaired by the rector, Rev. R. W. Campbell, was held in St. Mark's Anglican Church Hall, Kensington, on Wednesday, March 18th. The business before the meeting was the feasibility of improving and enlarging the building to provide greater convenience as a recreation and entertainment center, and better facilities for Sunday School classes and meetings. The meeting being unanimously in favor of the project, it was decided to have the building raised, a foundation placed beneath it, and an addition built on the front suitable for an entrance. Other improvements planned will include the installation of an oil burning furnace, and if the necessary land can be procured, the width of the hall will be increased to provide kitchen space. The ways and means committee now in operation was given the status and authority of a building committee. Let's Talk It Over

The statement has been made recently that pupils in Grade VII are not old enough to know what they intend to do, and should therefore not start to specialize at that early age. We certainly would not attempt to refute this, because we fully agree with it in principle. We think it should be explained, however, that a special situation sometimes arises which makes it advisable to give an occasional pupil in Grande VII instruction in industrial arts. There are a few cases, fortunately rare, where the pupil, or his parents, do not actually choose his special line of study, but, because of his inability to cope with the prescribed academic course, his further activity in school, if it is to be profitable at all, has to be chosen for him. Most teachers have encountered these cases where pupils have come to the end of their scholastic rope. Whether they haven't the capacity for further progress without special remedial teaching, or whether neglect on the part of earlier teachers has brought them to this "dead end" is water over the dam now. It is a "fait accompli" and must be reckoned with intelligently. In earlier days, the problem was often "solved" by the pupils leaving school. But since the advent of

"family allowances" these pupils remain in school. Parents sometimes believe their offspring is better off in the halls of learning in any case, that as long as he is exposed to school life and influences, some "learning" will brush off on him. When a pupil gets badly over his head, however, the path of education gets to be a bewildering labyrinth to him, causing him more harm than good.

In Summerside High School, and doubtless in other schools as well, the situation is met by reducing the pupil's academic course to the bare essentials commensurate with his capacity to absorb, and by adding manual training. Quite often the boy is the type that is able to do fairly good work in the industrial arts class, and his sense of frustration changes to a pleasurable feeling of achievement.

Some educators would put all pupils through the same mill regardless of their capacities to learn. They do this possibly relying on the democratic concept that "all men are born equal." This is true in a sense. In another sense, men are born as unequal as cattle or horses. No amount of patient training will change a "plug ugly" into Man O' War. By all means, give children all the basic, general education they can take, but, for their sakes, be quick to recognize the point at which they have come to be "dead end kids."

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. W. E. BROOKS —On the morning of March 14th the death occurred of Mrs. W. E. Brooks at her residence in Summerside, P. E. I., at the age of almost 78 years. Although in failing health for quite some time, her final illness was only of two weeks' duration. The late Mrs. Brooks was Mary Catherine Adams, daughter of Benjamin and Annie Adams, Sea View, P. E. I. 55 years ago she moved, with her family, to Springfield West, where she married W. E. Brooks on June 12th, 1901. There they resided until 1927 when they moved to O'Leary. For the past nine years they made their home in Summerside.

For many years the deceased was active in Sunday School work and in the Women's Missionary Society, as well as in church life. In recent years ill health has prevented active participation, although 1952 was the first occasion in 28 years that she, in the company of her husband, was unable to attend the meeting of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada at Sackville, N. B. Besides her husband, the late Mrs. Brooks leaves two sisters, Mrs. John Barwise and Mrs. James Morehead, both of Springfield West; a brother, Leigh of Lumsden, Saskatchewan; and four children: Mrs. Melvin Bridges (Joy) Oasumpic; Mrs. Walter MacArthur (Florence) Union Road; Rev. Garland C. Brooks, Windsor, N.S., and Mrs. Wesley Glennie (Una), Suffolk, P. E. I.

The funeral service was held in O'Leary United Church on Tuesday, March 17th. Rev. G. D. Matheson, Summerside, conducted a most helpful and much appreciated service, assisted by the student minister, Mr. B. Thurber. The music was under the direction of the United Church choir, Mrs. J. M. McWilliams, organist. Mr. Alvin Webb sang the solo "Sunset and Evening Star". The hymns sung were "The Lord's My Shepherd", "We Cannot Think of Them As Dead Who Walk With Us No More", and "Lead, Kindly Light". Interment was in Bethel United Church Cemetery, Springfield West and was conducted by the minister of the church, Rev. W. H. Forsythe, assisted by Rev. G. D. Matheson.
